

# Hill Juveniles Win York Simcoe By Whipping Barrie

The Richmond Hill OMHA Juveniles won the York Simcoe Hockey League Sunday afternoon in Richmond Hill by decisively whipping Barrie 6-2 in the fourth game of their best-of-five series.

Richmond Hill had won the first two games, dropped the third.

That final game was a "must" for Richmond Hill who had to win to wind it up or return to Barrie for the final game on Tuesday.

Richmond Hill opened the scoring in the first period on a goal by Kim Mabley from Brad Campbell and Allan Graham; and again early in the second on a score by Kevin Brillinger on passes from Don McPhee and Rick Sackfield.

Mabley made it 3-0 with

his second goal of the game from Jeff Switzer.

Barrie answered with one in the second to make the score read 3-1 going into the third.

Barrie scored early in the third to make it 3-2 but that was the one that brought Richmond Hill to life.

McPhee started it off by finding the range from Rick Sackfield. One minute later, Kevin Brillinger put the icing on the cake on a pass from Switzer.

There were only a few seconds to go when Mabley got a breakaway on a pass from Reg Armstrong and out-raced the clock to sink the puck at 19:58. It was his third goal of the game. It was Mister Transmission's third big championship this year.

It was tremendous team effort all the way with great goaling by Mark Edwards, Paul Beresford and Billy Woods.

Elmer McFadden presented the York Simcoe Trophy to Richmond Hill.

Transmission players and executive were unhappy about the calibre of refereeing throughout the series.

The second game of the series was won 3-2 by Richmond Hill.

Richmond Hill got the first goal with Don McPhee doing the honors unassisted.

Barrie came back to take a 2-1 lead in the same period with Richmond Hill's Mabley scoring the only goal in the second on a solo effort.

The game remained tied until late in the third when Mike Wood passed over to Paul Baillie who was being smothered by Barrie players. Paul got the puck back to George Lewandowski at the

point and he blasted it into the stick-side of the net for the winning goal.

Both Richmond Hill's Mark Edwards and Barrie's Jim Taylor were outstanding in their respective nets.

It was "do or die" for Barrie in the third game and they came up with a 5-4 win.

Richmond Hill opened the scoring once again with Scott Davey scoring unassisted with Barrie coming right back to take a 2-1 lead. The score was 4-2 for Barrie going into the third. Richmond Hill's goal was by Kim Mabley assisted by Allan Graham.

Mister Transmission scored first in the third to make it 4-3 on Paul Baillie goal on a face-off pass from Rick Sackfield.

Barrie came back with one at the 15-minute mark with Richmond Hill getting that one back on Tom Sanlon's goal from Tom Lamb.

Edwards was phenomenal in the Richmond Hill nets.

**Sutton School Fire**

Four juveniles have been arrested and charged with arson in connection with a \$200,000 fire at Sutton High School, April 1.

Fire first broke out in the locker room of the school and then 15 minutes later another fire was discovered in the gymnasium. The latter was completely destroyed.

York Regional Police arrested three 14-year old boys and a 13-year old the following day.

Two of the boys are from Keswick and two from Willow Beach.

Lightning was blamed for a fire, which struck a barn at the home of Don March, Centre Road, Keswick, April 3 at 10:45 pm.

A tractor and 100 pigs were destroyed as a result.

A fire at the home of John LeClaire, 183 St. Anthony Court, Richmond Hill, caused an estimated \$3,500 damage to the house and contents, April 6.

Richmond Hill Fire Department answered the call to the blaze, which occurred about 8 pm in a wall behind the fireplace.

Stain-covered rags were said to be the cause of a fire at the home of William Wood, 14 Sylvadene Parkway, in Vaughan, April 7.

According to Vaughan Fire Department officials, spontaneous combustion resulted from the rags being left to dry over a cardboard box.

Total damage was estimated at \$4,500.
