

RESIDENTIAL - HIGH DENSITY MULTI-PLE - permits a maximum of 60 high rise apartment units per acre.

SCHEDULE TO AMENDMENT No 52

RESIDENTIAL - LOW DENSITY MULTI-PLE - permits a maximum of 15 to 18 townhouse units per acre.

RESIDENTIAL - SINGLE FAMILY - permits single family houses as normally found in any subdivision.

INSTITUTIONAL - permits such uses as nursing homes, hospitals, community uses, etc.

NEIGHBORHOOD COMMERCIAL - permits commercial within a high density apartment project or as a small shopping centre.

INDUSTRIAL - for purposes of this proposed amendment would permit high quality industrial uses and office uses.

You are invited to attend the Hearing and state your support or objection to the amendment. Should you be unable to attend, written submissions will be received up to the time of the Hearing. The amendment and the existing land use maps may be examined at the Planning Office.
