OFFICIAL PLAN AMENDMENT NO. 52
BAYVIEW AVENUE

The purpose of this amendment is to redesignate lands shown on the accompanying map. Basically, lands currently designated high density are being proposed for lower density uses or high quality industrial in appropriate areas.

RESIDENTIAL - HIGH DENSITY MULTIPLE - permits a maximum of 60 high rise apartment units per acre.
RESIDENTIAL - LOW DENSITY MULTIPLE - permits a maximum of 15 to 18 townhouse units per acre.
RESIDENTIAL - SINGLE FAMILY - permits single family houses as normally found in any subdivision.
INSTITUTIONAL - permits such uses as nursing homes, hospitals, community uses, etc.
NEIGHBORHOOD COMMERCIAL - permits commercial within a high density apartment project or as a small shopping centre.
INDUSTRIAL - for purposes of this proposed amendment would permit high quality industrial uses and office uses.

You are invited to attend the Hearing and state your support or objection to the amendment. Should you be unable to attend, written submissions will be received up to the time of the Hearing. The amendment and the existing land use maps may be examined at the Planning Office.
