to perpetuate the life styles of their countries of origin which have little place in Canada. Foreign language newspapers, together with radio and television programming to suit the needs of these immigrant groups, further aggravate the situ-"A special aspect of the

immigration policy has to do with admittance of foreign persons on humanitarian grounds. While Canada has some responsibility to do its part as a member of the world community, acceptance of such persons in future should only be approved after careful consideration of the effect on the economic and cultural well-being of the country, in consultation with the provinces. The Legion feels Canada must also be especially careful in the acceptance of political refugees, particularly following the overthrow of their own governments. Their primary goal is to simply escape from the new regime, and their interest in becoming Canadian citizens is remote, or at the best incidental.

"The country now has what we feel is a serious problem in that many thousands of foreigners are in Canada illegally. The recent amnesty has permitted the authorities to legalize the status of thousands who have been here for long periods. But an unknown number are still unaccounted for. This suggests either a serious weakness in existing legislation, or inefficiency in law enforcement. The Legion views this matter as a possible threat to the security of our country.

"Another area of concern to the Legion is the large number of U.S. citizens who came to Canada, either as deserters from the armed forces, or as draft dodgers. While many individual Legion members have held strong views on the morality of the Vietnam operation, our membership was nevertheless outraged to know that the immigration laws could not stop this influx. Men who have served their country in war are not tolerant of such a matter, and we are convinced Canada has gained little from these men who chose not to obey the laws of their country. If the American government ever approves some form of amnesty, we believe many of the men concerned will return home, having used our country as an illegal sanctuary.

"We have looked carefully at the question of the admission of foreign students to pursue higher education in Canada. In all such cases, whether the individual is citizens with higher educa-
