### Blood Donor Rate Falls

The attendance was disappointing at the Richmond Hill Red Cross blood donor clinic last week with only 234 donors turning out. But only 203 units were collected.

The local clinic committee has been aiming at a target of 300 donors per clinic so this area could be more nearly self-supporting in hospital blood transfusions. But the level of giving has receded after surging ahead last

winter. This is the heavy demand season when summer vations cause the blood bank to run low and shortages to develop. The next Richmond Hill clinic is to be held on the afternoon and evening of August 29, The clinic is expected to be held at the regular location on Centre Street in the Richmond Hill Lions Hall.


