

Ontario Scholars From Thornhill Secondary Mostly University Bound

At the end of the school year, 174 students emerged as Ontario Scholars from York County Board of Education's 14 secondary schools. Dr. G. W. Williams Secondary in Aurora headed the list with 28, closely followed by Thornhill Secondary with 26.

At the top of the Thornhill list was Shirley Porter, 17, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Thomas Porter, Pinevale Road, Thornhill, with an average of 91.3 percent.

A junior councillor at a day camp in Downsview this summer, Shirley is interested in languages and plans to take a translators and interpreters course at Laurentian University, Sudbury, in the fall.
