Located at the corner of Davis Drive and Paterson Street, the new three storey building has 23,220 square feet of floor space to be used for medical offices, pharmacy, X-ray laboratory, bank, and medical laboratory. Parking space will be available for 84 vehicles. The general contract was awarded to W. G. Gallagher Construction Ltd. of Downsview in the amount of \$675,000.
