### Education System Produces Four Near Geniuses

THE CHILDREN ON THE HILL — by Michael Deakin. This remarkable book describing one family's bold experiment in the education of their own children, is bound to raise many questions about the basic nature of the teaching methods used in most schools. The book relates how the totally devoted parents of four children used a method based largely on the Montessori system to produce a family of near geniuses who show, as well, exceptional artistic and moral development. (Non-fiction.)

THE WITCHFINDER, A NOVEL OF DIABOLISM — by Maurice Hilliard. Newly-married Cass Hopkins grows more and more terrified as she comes to understand the significance of the cryptic notebooks kept by her husband's first wife, the weird garden which her predecessor had zealously cultivated, the handsome but sinister local doctor and mystical meetings held at night by her eccentric neighbors. (Fiction.)

THE ECHOING GREEN — MEMORIES OF REGENCY AND VICTORIAN YOUTH — by Gillian Avery. By drawing on actual diaries and memories the author has shown not only what it was like to grow up in the nineteenth century but also how attitudes changed gradually over the years and



England was transformed from a collection of sleepy rural provinces to the busy urban civilization it had become by 1900. (Non-fiction.)

THE BONGLEWEED — by Helen Cresswell. A skillfully developed fantasy for children about a wild, extravagant weed that grows totally out of control until it threatens to take over not only the heroine's home but also her entire life. (Fiction.)

PAIN — by Arthur S. Freese. All about every sort of pain whether caused by physical or psychological disorders and all about the methods now available to relieve pain including acupuncture, hypnosis, drugs, surgery and so forth.
