## Parents Fight To Save High School

The fire marshal will be playing a big part in the future of Newmarket High School.  
Monday night, hundreds of parents of present and future students, plus Mayor Robert Forhan of Newmarket and several of his councillors, met with members of York County Board of Education (in their own ancient edifice) to protest the impending closing of the Newmarket structure.  
The parents, who lined the stairs of the board offices six deep before the meeting started, were on hand to see that, as one placard put it: "Phoenix Must Rise Again."  
Not that Phoenix had ever completely fallen. It was just that, following a recent meeting with the chief architect for the Ministry of Education - plus several other officials - the board was given two alternatives regarding the school: abandon it and use space available elsewhere either within or outside Newmarket; satisfy the requirements of the Ontario Fire Marshal for the safety of the students and

continue to use the building without any improvement of the educational facilities.  
Neither alternative was a good one, so far as board staff was concerned.  
**CONTINUED GROWTH**  
Staff said that Newmarket and surrounding area would have a continued and uninterrupted growth for the next 10 to 15 years, according to the Toronto Centred Region Plan and the York Regional Planning Department. Enrolment predictions indicated the community would continue to need the pupil spaces available in the Newmarket school, while the building itself should be able to support educational developments of the last few years if quality education is to be provided.  
Complying with the requirements of the Fire Marshal would not necessarily provide safety for the students as enrolment grew.  
Also, on its present site, the school could not be enlarged to the extent required to achieve maximum benefits.  
As a result, it was recommended that: the board authorize staff to investigate and make recommendations for a

new site for the school; a building proposal be submitted to the Ministry of Education for a new high school to serve up to 1,000 students.  
Cost estimated are as follows: new building - \$2,700,000; demolition, alterations and meeting requirements of fire marshal - \$1,729,000; meeting requirements of fire marshal - \$250,000.  
**KEEP IT HERE**  
Newmarket Councillor Tom Taylor told the meeting that 1975 represented the 100th anniversary of the high school and the people wanted it continued in the town.  
He asked the board to withhold its decision on the school until a public meeting was held on the matter.  
Greg Currie, president of the students' council, said it would be a "big letdown" to be transferred elsewhere. "The whole school would feel like aliens," he said.  
Dr. Bud McCann asked the board to delay its decision. One of the considerations of living in Newmarket was that the children could walk to school.  
"We want the kids in school in time and in the school of their choice," he said.  
Another spokesman, John Del Grande, asked the board to attend a public meeting on the subject at Huron Heights School, September 4.  
The board then passed a motion to that effect, moved by Trustee Craig Cribar of Newmarket. Findings from that meeting will be passed on to the board for its next meeting, September 9.

**SEEK MEETING**  
Director of Education, Sam Chapman then suggested a meeting be made with the Minister of Education and William Hodgson M.L.A., York North, said he thought it should be held this week.  
A subsequent motion by Trustee Douglas Allen of Richmond Hill that the board attend the September 4 meeting to determine what course of action to take to the minister, subsequent to the board's September 9 meeting, was defeated.  
Said Trustee Marvin Hunter of King: "If we don't get permission from the fire marshal to open September 3, it's a brand new ball game."  
A subsequent motion by Mr. Cribar, calling for a public meeting September 4, followed by a meeting of the board with the minister prior to its September 9 session, was carried.  
Named to represent the board at the public meeting were: Cribar, chairman; and Trustees John Raniowski, Schomburg, John McMurray, Whitechurch, Stouffville; Mariane Gillan, Georgina Township, and Tom Johnston, Keswick.

## Markham Latest Hit Barn Fire

Both Vaughan and Whitchurch-Stouffville had their barn fires last week. This week it was Markham's turn.  
The fire burst out in a building leased by Albert Saunders, Concession 7, about 3:50 pm August 25.  
Mr. Saunders was putting hay in the loft via an elevator when the fire started. Defective wiring in the lift is believed to have caused the blaze.  
Damage was estimated at \$25,000. Markham Fire Department attended.  
**3 CAR FIRES**  
The Markham fire fighters were also called on to put out a fire in two vehicles belonging to David Blaney,

apartment 106, 111 Wellington Street, August 23.  
Both a 1962 Thunderbird automobile and a cedar strip boat, which were in an underground parking lot, were destroyed.  
Police Constable Paul Metcalfe, who investigated the fire, suffered smoke inhalation and was treated at Scarborough Centenary Hospital and released.  
In Vaughan, firemen extinguished a fire in a car belonging to Earl Sheffield, Proton Station, Ontario, August 24 at Bathurst Street and Steeles Avenue.  
A total of \$600 damage was done to the car.
