

## Former Holder Of World Record Joins Forces At Hill Aquatic Club

A former world record holder is the new head coach of the Richmond Hill Aquatic Club, bringing with him a wealth of international experience to local swimmers.

Dan Sherry, who joined the club last week, set a new world butterfly record in Blackpool, England, when he competed in the National Games in 1965.

Sherry has also competed in Olympic and other international events around the world and had coaching experience in leading American universities such as Indiana and Michigan State.

He competed in the Cuban International Games in Havana in 1961 and began a career that literally took him around the world. He swam in the British Empire Games in Perth, Australia, in 1962 and the following year swam in the Pan American Games at La Polo, Brazil.

In 1964 he competed in the Olympic Games in Tokyo. A year before he smashed the world record in the 100 metres butterfly with a time of 57.1 seconds.

His coaching experience is extensive.

He has headed North York Aquatic Club and Hamilton Aquatic Club and assisted in clinics with leading coaches at several universities in the United States.

RHAC President Al Branch commented that the acquisition of Sherry "represents a major step in the development of the Richmond Hill club which is still young and growing."

"Through him we hope to attract increased membership, not only in and around The Hill, but from swimmers in the Aurora and Thornhill districts."

Mr. Branch noted for the benefit of parents that Sherry began competitive swimming at the age of 10, competed nationally at the age of 12 and internationally at the age of 14.

STOUFFVILLE: Stouffville Stockyard has banned the sale of dogs and cats and has ruled that these animals cannot be given away on the premises. The reason for the new ruling is that people were bringing domestic pets and just leaving them behind if they couldn't get rid of them, in the bottom of a barrel, a sack or a cardboard box. Others were often abandoned along the road-sides.

BARRIE: After six years of squabbling and financial problems this city is to get a new courthouse. The new complex, estimated to cost \$5,600,000, will provide new, roomier supreme and county courtrooms, enlarged office space and facilities. It will link up with the old sheriff's office, the registry building and family courtroom. It is hoped to be ready for November 1976.

STOUFFVILLE: Planning board has approved in principle a 17-unit commercial plaza which will also include 17 two-bedroom apartments above the stores. It is to be located on the south side of Main Street, adjacent to the as yet uncompleted southerly extension of Stouffer Street.
