Thornhill Exchange Student In Germany

September 2nd. i went to school with Godrun on this day. She has only girls in her school. No sorry, there are boys in the younger grades. Everyone here is so healthy. I sat with Godrun in her classes and tried to understand what the teachers were saying. Alas, I could not. Only in one class - that was English! I went to the front of the class and briefly told them about my life in Canada and the school system there. The girls listened attentively and I believe they understood most of what I said. They are friendly and also laugh at me. I just smile with them even though I can't un-

derstand what they say. In English class they are reading American Short Stories. I read aloud one very good story to the class and there was a stir while I read so I think they enjoyed it. Incidentally, the stories were very

hard to read. I couldn't pronounce many of the words. The English teacher is going to make a timetable for me. They are very understanding. I can do my schoolwork in their classes and I will not be on the regular timetable.

We take the streetcar to school and we walk a long way. The buildings in the school are old and picturesque. I have only been to school one day so far, so I cannot tell you more. School ends at 12 or 1.00 p.m. and then we either go home or shop etc. I like the way they eat here. In the morning at 6:30 pm before school (I get up at that hour) we have cocoa and rye bread and jam. We are at school by 7:45 am. We leave the house at 7:00 am and walk to the streetcar, take that for a long way and then walk to

We are at school for about

four hours, then we come home for lunch (at breakfast Frau Scholl makes us a snack of a sandwich and fruit which we sneak during classes to keep us going. We have this in the same plastic bag éveryday. No waste here!) For lunch we have a cooked meal. The first day we had goulash and rice.

Oh, Gretchen, was right about the warm milk, but I have got used to it already. I don't eat the skin though! Then, if we are hungry during the afternoon we help ourselves to a snack. I have not needed to yet. At 6:00 pm we have our Abendessen. This is light. We have bread with cold meat, jam and cheeses. We have tea (no cream or milk in the tea). I like this way of eating. It agrees with me!

Daddy, last night I played tennis at a girl's house. She has two courts. Then we drank red wine and watched TV and read catalogues. She has the courts with the soft red surface. It was hard to get used to, the balls don't bounce. Tonight we are going dancing. The farmhand. Schmed, who is a black boy of around 20, is coming. He seems nice but doesn't speak any English.

This weekend we might go to the black forest with Gudrun's brother if it doesn't rain. I have not seen him too much but he must be nice. It is weird but now when I

am writing English I hesitate and keep on thinking that I have made mistakes. My German is improving but when I talk to Gudrun I speak English if I don't don't know the German words. Today I was very happy. School was fun and the girls force me to speak to them in German which is hard. How they love to laugh! They are always giggling. Two girls were free for a class so they

took me to the city library. It is huge. We walked for miles! I am walking so much these

Gudrun and I went for a bike ride - on one bike! It was hilarious because couldn't see in front of me as I was on the back holding onto her. I would see a fence in front of us and we would be going straight for it. I would panic and put my feet down. She would scream because the bike would jerk and then, as we fell off, I would see the opening in the fence directly in front of us.

We went shopping today and I bought some writing paper, envelopes, and postcards. Gut nein? Tomorrow I am going swimming with the class and on Friday we are travelling to Baden Baden to visit the art gallery. Auf wiedersehn!






