Midnight Swim Fatal For King Nudist

A midnight swim ended in disaster for a woman at Glen Echo Nudist Camp, Concession 7, King, last week. According to York Regional Police, Helga Blaes, 42, of Gray Avenue, Toronto, failed to surface after she dove into the water at the camp, about 12:15 am September 20. Drugging operations were carried out by York Police and members of Vaughan Fire Department. The woman's nude body was recovered at 3 a.m.

A near fatality was averted in a bizarre incident at a Woodbridge corn roast September 22.

Police said one of the guests had combined Valium with liquor and had fallen into the fire at the roast.

Taken to York Finch Hospital, where she was treated for burns to her buttocks, arms and shoulder was Lorraine Phillips, 33, of Driftwood Avenue, Downsview.

One motor fatality was reported last week. James McCaig, 19, of Jacarandah Drive, Newmarket, died about two hours after being injured in an accident just off Highway 11, near Newmarket, September 21 about 12:20 a.m.

Police said the youth lost control of his car, just after leaving the highway and turning down a dirt road, and flipped over in the vehicle.

He was taken to York County Hospital, where he died at 2:45 a.m.

A wild ride through Richmond Hill streets on a motorcycle Saturday night, ended in arrest for a Downsview youth.

FLYING MAYHEM

Police said the youth lost control of his bike while driving down Mill Street and hit a hydro pole on the north side of the road. He then skidded to the other side of the street and struck another pole.

He also managed to cause extensive damage to a couple of vehicles parked at 90 Starlight Crescent.

The youth fled when approached by police, but was apprehended a short time later.

Facing charges of dangerous and impaired driving is Terrence Stephen, 19, of Shepherd Avenue.

Saturday seemed to be the day for misguided motorbikes in the area.

In Maple, a motorcyclist was observed driving along Keele Street without any license plates. When spotted by police, he sped off, ignoring stop signs and almost hitting a child on Major Mackenzie Drive, according to police.

Facing a charge of dangerous driving is Stephen Van Luyk, 16, Netherford Road, Maple.

Standing on the street corner is getting to be a dangerous pastime, even in Richmond Hill.

Three youths told police that, while they were waiting for a taxi at 276 Cedar

Avenue, they were approached by two men, who asked them for a cigarette. They were then punched and kicked.

ASSAULT CHARGES

Facing charges of common assault and assault occasioning bodily harm against Barry Crinall, 15, of McConvey Drive, Willmington, 15, of North Taylor Mills Drive; and Michael Barber, 16, of Downsview, are John McCormack, 21, of Cedar Avenue, and Michael Judge, 18, of Oak Ridges.

Kenneth Morin, 24, of Yonge Street, Willowdale, faces a charge of indecent assault, following an incident in Richmond Hill last week.

A 14-year-old girl told police that she and her sister were picking flowers on Langstaff Sideroad about 4:45 pm September 22 when they were approached by a man who told them they were trespassing and would be fined \$50.

However, if they agreed to "horse around" with him, he would let them off. He then started to indecently assault the child.

A would-be burglar in Maple Saturday night didn't have a chance.

Bruce Thomson, 5 Station Street, told police he returned home about 10 pm to find the lights on in his house.

He and his family then surrounded the house and called police. A man was

then seen coming out of an upstairs room, and was grabbed by the waiting Thomsons and held for police.

Henry Rae, 20, of Jane Street, Maple, faces a charge of breaking and entering.

A quantity of the costly hen fruit and several rocks were tossed through a window of MacKillop Public School, Lucas Street, over

the weekend, causing \$45 worth of damage.

Fires Not Only Concern

Firefighters Have Busy Week In More Than Just One Area

It's not just fires that keep area firefighters on the run. Last week, Richmond Hill Fire Department, besides answering the usual fire calls, acted as standby for Vaughan Fire Department while it was out on a major call, and also visited Hillcrest Mall to do battle with a faulty sprinkler system.

The latter call occurred September 22 at 11:48 am at Top Drug Mart when a "surge of pressure" activated the sprinkler system in the store and threatened to flood the premises.

The firemen plugged the system until it could be shut off, but not before some \$8,000 damage had been done.

\$5,000 DAMAGE
A fire of undetermined origin at Ronalds Federated, 10481 Yonge Street, resulted in \$5,000 damage September 16, about 8:50 pm.

The fire broke out in the shipping room and received some resistance from the plant sprinkler system before the Hill department arrived to bring it under control.

Chief Robert Kennedy's men also answered a call at Oxford Picture Frames, 278 Newkirk Road—no damage—and responded to 14 grass and bush fires within the week.

Vaughan Fire Department was equally busy.

"Biggest fire of the week occurred at Canadian Building Materials, Highway 7, west of Woodbridge, September 18 at 8:30 pm.

The fire started in the area of the furnace and engulfed several small oil tanks, conveyor belt and a small tower. Ten employees, working in the area, man-

aged to escape from the burning building.

The fire, which caused \$210,000 damage, was brought under control by 10:15 pm.

Richmond Hill Fire Department covered for the Vaughan crew while they were at the CBM fire.

CONCORD BLAZE
Another major blaze occurred at Bilnor Express Lines Limited, 11 Credistone Road, Concord, September 23, as a result of vandalism.

Jerry Stuckless, a driver with the company, told police he was attempting to start his 1974, 10-ton truck, which was parked in the

company yard, when the engine backfired and a fire broke out.

The fire quickly spread through the cab to the box area and contents, completely destroying the former.

A later check of the vehicle revealed that the carburetor and air attachments had been removed. Also, 35 gallons of gas had been siphoned from the tank.

Damage to the truck was \$10,000. Damage to the contents, which belonged to the Windsor Board of Education, was unknown.

The Vaughan department also answered minor calls at Monsanto Canada Limited,

8214 Kipling Avenue; Huntington Golf Club, Highway 50; and Provincial Roofing, 133 Maplecreek Road.

In Markham, the department was called out to extinguish a blaze in a car being refuelled at G.E.M. Stores gas pumps, Yonge Street and Meadow View Road, September 17.

The car, which was owned by Daniel McKinley, Lord Seaton Drive, Willowdale, was completely destroyed.

Cause of the fire was believed to have been due to a jammed cigarette lighter.

The car was pushed away from the pumps before the fire had a chance to spread.

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
