Dynes' Ordeal Over

The Richmond Hill Dynes Jewellers made it official Tuesday night of last week as they dropped a 4-3 game to Scarboro Lindal Homes and bowed out of the 1974 Toronto and District Major Fastball League playoffs.

It was also "all over" for the season for the Jewellers who lost the opening game of the best-of-three series by 2-0 in Richmond Hill Sunday of last week.

The Jewellers went down fighting on this occasion as they led by 3-0 at one point only to have the proverbial roof topple on them in the seventh inning as Lindal Homes rallied to tie the game.

The final crunch came in the bottom of the ninth as starting and finishing Dynes' hurler Frank Marshall gave up a lead-off single to Gord Davies. He went to second on a sacrifice and rode home with the winning run on Ken Craig's double.

ENTER NIGHTMARE

It was a nightmarish ending for a bright beginning for Marshall who had a one-walk, no-hit game going for him until that fateful seventh. He walked the first batter in the first inning and retired the side one-two-three for the next five innings. He allowed a total of six hits while striking out six. The Jewellers played errorless ball behind him.

The winner was old Dynes bugaboo Doug Webster who is a Richmond Hill product trowing for the Lindal Homes crew.

WEBSTER WINS

Webster allowed the Jewellers six hits while walking none and striking out 10. He got off to a rocky start with the help of his teammates (they committed five errors in he game) in the first inning as Mickey Hancock led off with a single and went to second on a

wild pitch. The batsmen were out when Dave Russell hit to shortstop Ivors Jaunzen who threw wildly to first base with Hancock scoring.

Richmond Hill threatened again in the second as Danny Boyne and Larry Rodger opened with singles only to die on base as the next three batters were outs.

The fifth inning saw Dynes catching fire again as Hancock went down swinging but reached first safely as Catcher Gary Battaglia let the ball get away from him. There were two out when Catcher Bob Shelton homered to make it 3-0.

Enter the seventh inning. **FOUR HITS IN ROW**

Marshall gave up four singles to the first four batters in the persons of Dave Day, Vere Small, Davies, and Janzen. Janzen's hit brought in two runs.

The game was tied when Craig's infield grounder to Third Baseman Bob Smith was tossed home in an attempt to get the runner heading for the plate. Shelton missed on the tag.

That set the scene for the ninth inning.

Other Master bowlers are Betty Wolfreys, Ernie Wolfreys, Ev Jones and Bill Jones. These people all help with instruction of the youth bowlers and in running of the youth league on a Saturday. These Master bowlers are not only good bowlers but work hard at setting up leagues as well as instruction.

INSTRUCTIONAL TIP

Spot bowling is used by just about all the top bowlers in Ontario. The spots or darts are located approximately 15 feet away from the foul line, the pins are 60 feet away.

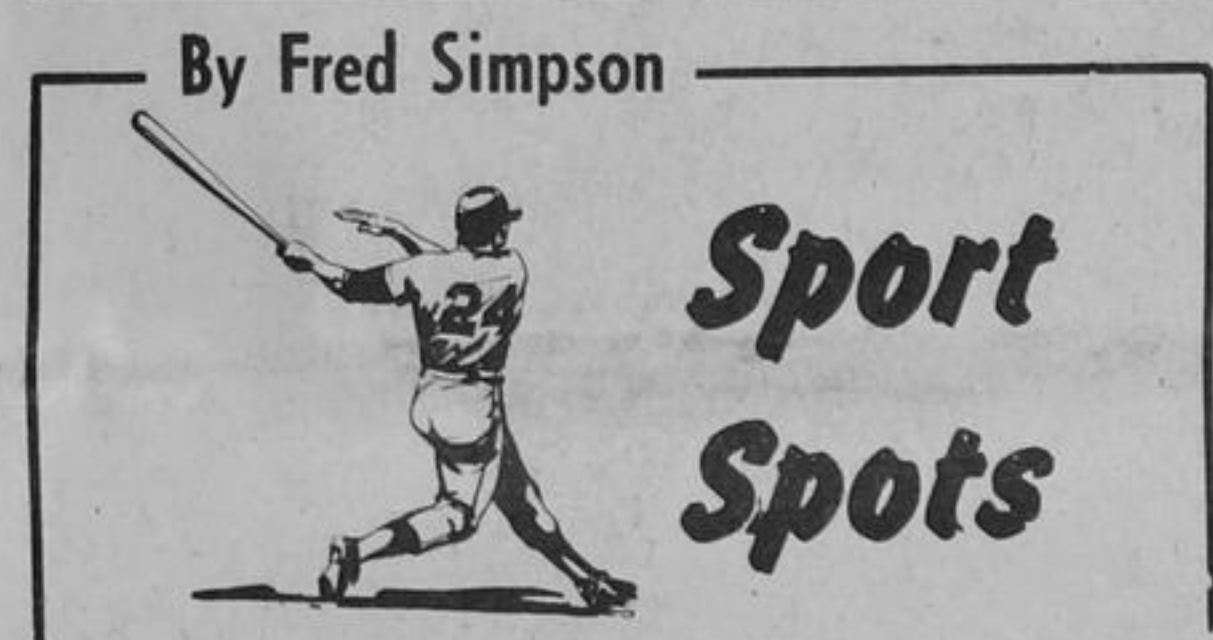
In explaining spot bowling to new bowlers we use what we call the rifle technique. The spot where the bowler stands on the approach is the rear sight, and the dart over which the ball is rolled is the front sight. If the bowler is lined up correctly, delivers the ball correctly and it rolls over the proper dart, he will hit the pin he wants to hit. This method of bowling is easier than pin bowling and more accurate.

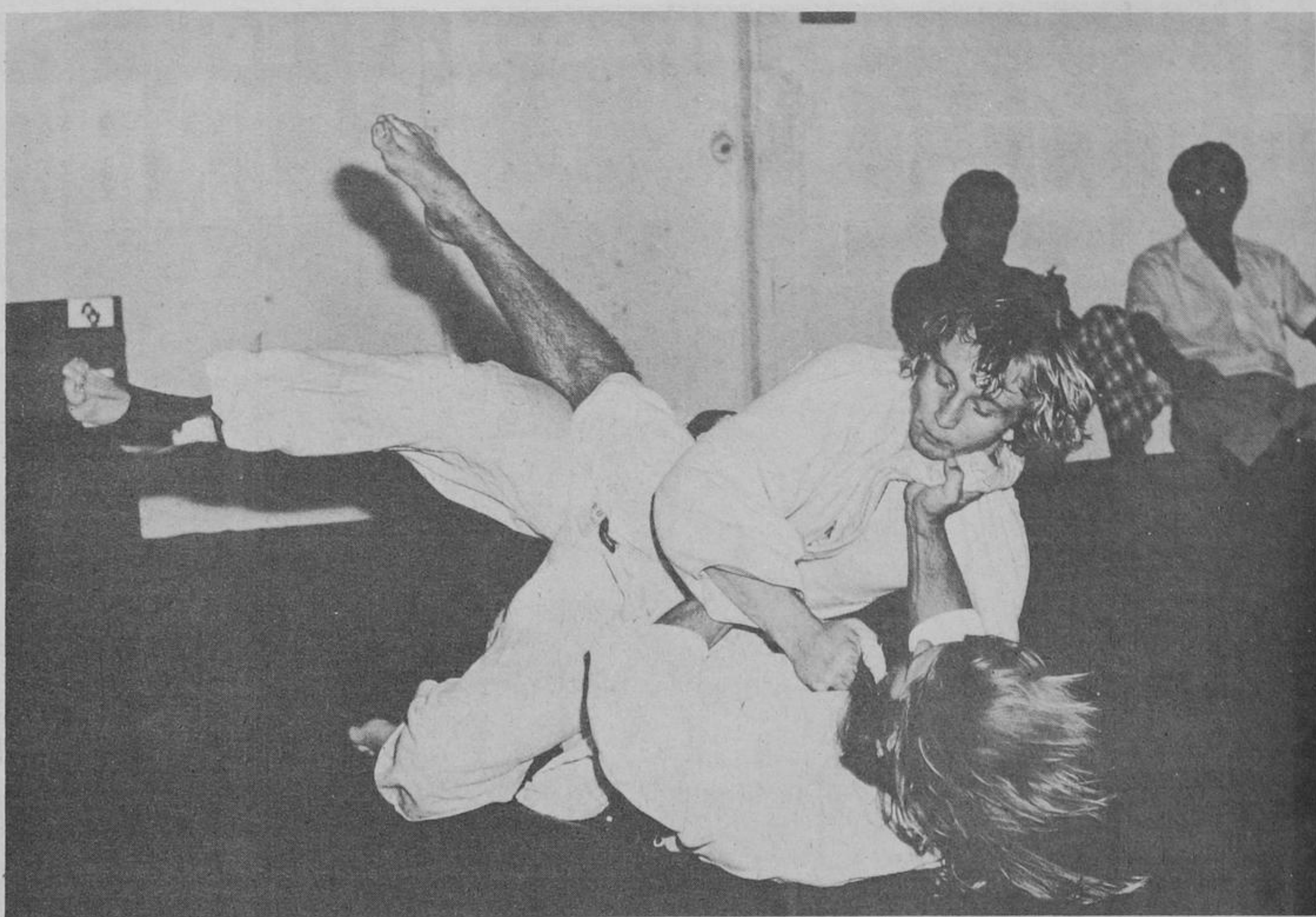
Of Sunday's game there's much room for improvement.
