instruction. INSTRUCTIONAL TIP Spot bowling is used by

just about all the top bowlers in Ontario. The spots or darts are located approximately 15 feet away from the foul line, the pins are 60 feet away. In explaining spot bowl-

ing to new bowlers we use what we call the rifle technique. The spot where the bowler stands on the approach is the rear sight, and the dart over which the ball is rolled is the front sight. If the bowler is lined up correctly, delivers the ball correctly and it rolls over the proper dart, he will hit the pin he wants to hit. This method of bowling is easier than pin bowling and more accurate.
