OAK RIDGES DETACHMENT Buttonville, Markham persons injured in highway accidents

The Ontario Provincial Police detachment at Oak Ridges reported two personal injury accidents in the area last week.

In the first accident, Barrie Dales, 33, of Buttonville, was injured when the car he was driving was in collision with a motorcycle driven by David McPhee, 20, of Toronto.

Police said the Dales' vehicle was eastbound on Highway 7 and made a left turn in front of the west-bound motorcycle.

Both McPhee and his passenger, Margaret Felfoldi, 21, of Toronto, were taken to Scarborough Centenary Hospital for treatment of injuries. Total damage to the vehicles involved was estimated at \$3,200.
