

2 provincial schemes for Yonge St. in Hill

Two schemes have been prepared by the Ministry of Transportation and Communication for the reconstruction of Yonge Street from Highway 7 to Markham Road in Richmond Hill.

Thornlea station later Rolling stock will be ready for GO trains

The three diesel locomotives required for the GO Train service between Richmond Hill and Toronto should be delivered by the new year, according to Managing Director Bill Howard of the Toronto Area Transit Operating Authority. He also says orders have been placed with the Ontario Northland Railway for three more auxiliary power cab units and with Hawker Siddeley Canada, Limited, for 30 passenger cars.

He also announced the northern terminal will be at the Richmond Hill GO station which currently serves GO Transit bus services to Toronto. An ultimate capacity of almost 1,000 vehicles in a free parking area will be available here.

Thornlea Station
Another station is proposed for the area of Bayview Avenue and Royal Orchard Road in Thornlea, and a third station for Highway 401 and Leslie Street with parking for about 500 cars. All trains will terminate at Toronto Union Station.

The running time of a GO train from Richmond Hill to Union Station will be 35 to 40 minutes with each additional station adding about three minutes.

Initially the service will provide three southbound trains in the morning and three northbound evening runs, five days a week. When traffic warrants, the

RC separate school supporters elect 14 trustees December 2

In the 1974 elections which will be held December 2 separate school supporters of York Region will elect two trustees to the York County Board of Education and 14 trustees to the York Region Roman Catholic School Board.

The two trustees elected to the county public board of education will represent the interests of separate school supporters in the secondary schools of the region. One will be elected from the combined municipalities of Markham and Richmond Hill, the other will represent all other municipalities in the Region.

To be eligible, a candidate must be: a Canadian citizen, 18 years of age, a resident within York Region and a

separate school supporter.

STEPS FOR CANDIDATES

Candidates should obtain the necessary information and nomination paper from the clerk of his or her municipality, secure the signatures of 10 separate school electors whose names appear on the voters' list and file these between November 7 and 5 p.m. November 12. Papers must be filed with the Markham Clerk at 8911 Don Mills Road for Richmond Hill and Markham and with the Vaughan Clerk in Maple for the rest of the region.

The 14 trustees of the Roman Catholic Board are allocated: three from Markham, three from Rich-

mond Hill, two from Vaughan, two from King and one each from Aurora, Georgina, Newmarket and Whitchurch - Stouffville - East Gwillimbury.

To qualify to run for these positions a person must be a Canadian citizen and 18 years of age.

The same procedure is followed in connection with nomination papers as in the case of the representatives on the board of education, but these papers are filed with the clerk of the municipality involved.

In information being distributed throughout the parishes of the Region, it is noted that to be a candidate, it is not enough to be a British subject, a candidate

must hold Canadian citizenship.

NAME SCRUTINEERS

It is also noted that each candidate may name a scrutineer, at least 16 years old, to represent him at the polling place and at the counting of ballots for each polling place.

The advance poll will be held November 23. Further information may be obtained from the municipal clerk or from the board offices at 889-9792 or 773-4326.
