### Markham to study housing action only

Markham Town Council last week agreed to seek financing from the Ministry of Housing for "certain studies" to see how the Ontario Housing Action Program will affect the town on an over-all basis. Under the program, the Ministry said it hoped the regional municipalities

would become the "senior responsible housing authority of their area of jurisdiction. "Should both regional and local municipalities not wish to assume this responsibility

and should the area be designated as suitable for accelerated housing programs, the Ministry is prepared to assume complete responsibility for the program without any consultation with the municipalities concerned," the report said.

Big stick fear At that time, Councillor Bob Adams, who is head of Markham's planning committee, said he was concerned about the government's action in that respect, terming the

statement a "sad state of affairs". The government was saying, in effect that, if the municipalities didn't respond, it would go ahead regardless.

last week, Mr. Adams said the town shouldn't take people faster than it could absorb them. Dickson Hill - Victoria
