A tractor-trailer collided with a hydro pole on Highway 7 at Islington Avenue just before 5 pm Friday and residents of Woodbridge and the surrounding area were without electric power for at least seven hours.

Emergency crews from Vaughan Township Hydro worked until 3 am to restore the hydro service. Power was restored in some areas within a couple of hours of the accident.

It was an all-round team effort with stars of the game as selected by Coach Richard Hughes being Rae and goalie Gord Stanway.

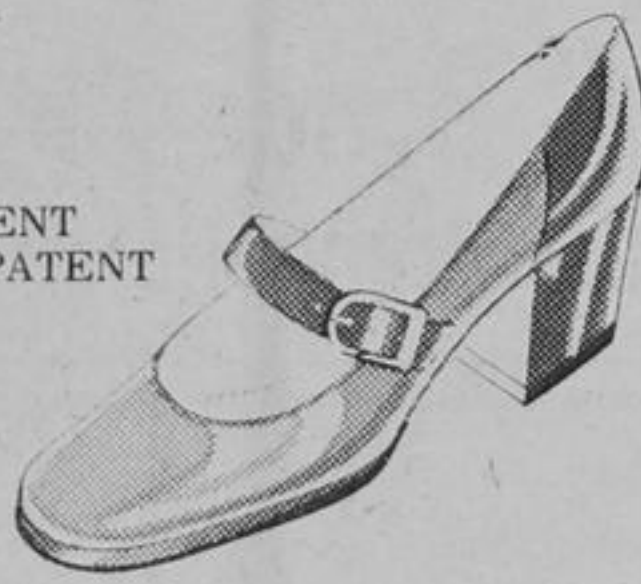
