Instructional Tip
 For the next few weeks we'll look at different types of deliveries. First we'll look at the curve ball. This is one of the most effective ways of getting "mixing" action amongst the pins, but is also one of the hardest to control.

To throw the curve ball is just a matter of rotating the palm of the hand inwards, from the bottom to the top of the ball during the forward swing. How do you control the curve ball?

I don't have an answer for that, and that's why I don't recommend a curve ball for a beginner. The ball is effective — when it hits the target. But with all the spin it has, it's very difficult to hit the target with any degree of consistency. A slight change in speed of delivery can cause a large change in the size of curve. Following the route taken by world champion Karen Magnussen and Canadian champion Toller Cranston, skaters must first qualify through the sectional competitions in novice, junior and senior events, singles, pairs and dance.

The four best in each event carry on to one of three divisional competitions, where the top three may then go on to compete in the Canadian Nationals.

The top four competing in the different classes this weekend will be eligible to compete at the Eastern Divisionals, to be held this year in Oshawa, January 9-12.

The Canadian Nationals are January 28 to February 1 in Quebec City.

Thursday, from 6 pm to 11 pm there will be figure competitions for the junior and novice, mens' and ladies' singles.

Friday beginning at 6 pm the senior men and ladies will compete in the singles figures class, followed by the junior ladies' singles compulsory free skating, novice pairs, senior dance and junior pairs.

During the day on Saturday, beginning at 10:30 am, there will be competitions for the pre-novice men and ladies (singles-figures), social mixed dance, junior mens' compulsory program, novice ladies' free skating, pre-novice dance, junior pairs.
