
Markham District Firefighters aid St. John Ambulance Brigade

# Daybreak is happy place for mentally handicapped

Daybreak, a home for the mentally handicapped, is a happy place, Sister Sue Hosteller told members of York County University Women's Club at their recent meeting.

Sister Hosteller came to live at Daybreak in Richmond Hill in 1972 as an assistant in one of the houses on the 20-acre property and now heads Daybreak Publications which distributes the works of Dr. Jean Vanier and related authors.,

Fashioned after Dr. Vanier's L'Arche comin France, Daybreak was founded in 1969 by Stephen and Ann Newroth, who are still directors of the home, and the "Friends of L'Arche"

New concept At Daybreak, said Sister Hosteller, the mentally handicapped and the staff share the work and life of a single community, trying to help each other develop

almost every major city in Canada and are being founded in the U.S.A., India and Africa.

The house and property were donated to Daybreak by Our Ladies Missionaries Order after two of the sisters heard a lecture at the University of Toronto by Dr. Vanier. (It had served for many years as Mother House of the Order, but with changing times a decision had been taken to move into the city, closer to the people they serve.)

Active farm Two residences have been built behind the large main house, and the land around them is farmed by the residents.

At present 26 adults and 14 assistants live at Daybreak, said Sister Mosteller. Most of those who come to help do so as a result of having heard Vanier's lectures. They stay for varying

periods of time. Few of the inhabitants will ever gain employment in a competitive job, she told the women. Most work in herd's milk output, and take

sheltered workshops nearby or on the farm, and can be expected to spend their lives in this home.

## Serious times for dairymen

Dairy farmers in southwestern York Region are facing a very serious situation this winter, according to Agriculture Representative Al Wall. He reports 20 percent of the York dairy industry located

in this area Poor planting weather in the spring, the long summer drought and early frost has cut the yield of home grown fodder. Pasture conditions were poor this summer, also, he said.

Coupled with the high

price of feed grains, this has

forced the farmers to cut the

amount they feed their

cattle and thus reduce their

a loss in revenue. An average farmer might

run 25 to 35 head of dairy cattle and have a daily milk quota of about 1,000 pounds. In southwestern York some farmers are already finding their production cut by 10 to 20 percent. At \$10.85 per hundred pounds for fluid milk paid by the marketing board, it could mean a loss of more than \$20 a day.

Lose quota But more important is the fact that farmers who ship less than 90 percent of their quota for two consecutive months lose that part below

90 percent. If the quota is

1,000 pounds, for instance,

and the farmer ships only

850 pounds for two months, he would lose 50 pounds of quota - more than \$5 daily in cash.

And, according to Mr. Wall, once the quota is taken away, it's gone for good. The only way a farmer can increase his quota is to buy a portion of another dairyman's quota.

Transfer tax

But there is even a penalty for this since the marketing board takes 25 percent of any quota sold "as sort of a transfer tax".

The ag. rep. said "a number" of dairy farmers are in danger of losing part of their quota
