## Keswick farmer had largest corn yield

Northern York Region farmers had the highest corn yields this past season. David Pegg of Keswick was high with 128 bushels and Jack Crittenden, also of Keswick, had 122.

Murray Cupples of Mount Albert had 110. Joe Lundy of Queensville had 109. Ken Stevenson of Urdora had 108.

Full details will be given, along with many other topics of interest, at the annual meeting of the Crop Improvement Association January 7 at East Gwillimbury Community Centre. Agricultural Representative Art Wall has announced.

### Moisture hurting

High moisture content in corn, coupled with high feed prices, is hurting some cattle raisers. Dairymen are having a struggle to keep production up and beef cattle gains are off.

High moisture corn requires a much higher rate of feeding than usual to get good performance. Very wet corn keeps well but comes out with an acid flavor that cattle don't like. Mixing in some dry grain is about the only way to maintain high feeding rates.

The ag. rep. has worked out prices for wet corn compared to dry corn price for farm to farm sales. Dry corn at 30 percent for example is worth \$80 a ton when dry corn is \$3.50 per bushel.

If moisture goes up to 35 percent, the price drops to \$73 and wet shelled corn at this level would be worth \$95 a ton.
