Funeral for city mission worker Laura Fidler, 77

There passed away peacefully at the Cobblestone Nursing Home, Aurora, December 31, 1974, Laura Bertha Fidler, beloved wife of Allan Hoover of Gormley. Born in 1897 in New Jersey, she was the daughter of the late Rev. J. E. Fidler and Elizabeth Rittenhouse. As a child, she accompanied her missionary parents to Turkey, where they served during part of their several

years in the ministry. 
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
