Funeral for city mission worker Laura Fidler, 77

There passed away peacefully at the Cobblestone Nursing Home, Aurora, December 31, 1974, Laura Bertha Fidler, beloved wife of Allan Hoover of Gormley. Born in 1897 in New Jersey, she was the daughter of the late Rev. J. E. Fidler and Elizabeth Rittenhouse. As a child, she accompanied her missionary parents to Turkey, where they served during part of their several years in the ministry.

At an early age Bertha felt the call to spiritual work and served most successfully at Petrolia, St. Catharines and St. Thomas as a City Mission Worker under what was known then as the Menonite Brethren In Christ Church (now known as the Missionary Church) of the Ontario Conference.

She was a very capable speaker and talented singer and will be remembered by some as she sang most capably in the City Mission Workers' Quartette.

In 1925 she felt constrained to go to Syria as a missionary where she served until 1930. She later served as first director of the Ontario Conference Women's Missionary Society for the church and

will be remembered in the area as a frequent guest speaker in the interest of missions.

In 1934 she married Allan Hoover of Gormley, where they have been respected residents for 40 years. On account of deteriorating health, she retired to the Cobblestone Nursing Home in 1970.

Surviving besides her husband, Allan, are three sons, David of Gormley, Keith of Montreal and Paul of Denver, Colorado, and seven grandchildren; also two sisters, Ruth (Mrs. Alvin Losie) of South Bend, Indiana and Ethel (Mrs. Gordon Johnson) of Blenheim. She was predeceased by three sisters and two brothers, Naomi, Anna (Mrs. Harry Haacke), John, Elsie and Elmer.

The funeral service was held at the Christian and Missionary Alliance Church in Unionville, conducted by the minister, Rev. Howard Richardson, assisted by Rev. Gordon Johnson, who brought the message and paid tribute to his highly respected sister-in-law.

Burial was in the Heise Hill Cemetery, directed by Grant Marshall and assistants of the Marshall Funeral Home in Richmond Hill.

Eversley's historic St. Andrew's floodlit

"Let there be light" was the phrase used by King Mayor Margaret Britnell as she threw a symbolic gold switch and (indirectly) illuminated the historical Church of St. Andrew's, Eversley, on December 20 at 7:45 pm.

Not very original, but certainly fitting, the phrase officially commissioned the outdoor floodlighting of the 140-year-old building which was used as a place of worship and a schoolhouse in those pioneer days of 1834.

The King Township Historical Society had considered this lighting project as one of their challenges. And there is no doubt Reverend John Tawse (1837 school teacher and minister) would have been pleased.

Ward 5 King Councillor Elect Doug Brookes recently installed the wiring for the cost of the materials. Councillor Brookes is an electrician and member of the society. The outdoor spotlights are wired to a timer so they will come on at 6 o'clock each evening.

Bill Poulis welcomed everyone to the ceremony (including the press, although only The Liberal turned out) and gave a short speech about the lighting.

As the lights went on, the stone walls stood out against the dark night with the windows sparkling with frost. Frank Ujoh, chairman of the Eversley Church Committee, was also present for the ceremony.

The Crawford Wells General Store, King, is selling framed prints of an original drawing by Dorothy Clark McClure (\$15.50). As well, there is notepaper with the same view of the old church.

A notice on the back of the picture states Lady Eaton purchased the property "to preserve the religious purpose and historical significance of the little building and cemetery".

The church was presented to the York Pioneer Historical Society in 1967 and is now being restored by the King Township Historical Society, inside and out, to its original beauty.

The King Society plan to add heating and use the building for their meetings and for other community activities. It will also be available for weddings.

The church is located on Dufferin Street, north of the King Sideroad, just south of the settlement of Snowball.
