Richmond Hill Council learned for the first time January 7 that the Ministry of Transportation and Communications has a third alternative for the proposed reconstruction of Yonge Street through Thornhill and south Richmond Hill.

Water cut off in King City

Residents of King City had a dry Sunday following a power blackout Saturday night.

The high winds knocked down hydro wires and disrupted service in the west side of King City where the village's wells are located. When the hydro service was reinstated the pump on Well One burned out. But it was not until Sunday morning this was realized. Mayor Margaret Britnell urged the 2,000 residents of the village to save water until the pump could be replaced. By Tuesday water service was normal.

A new pump was rushed in from Barrie and the old pump taken out for repairs. Crews were hard at work all day Sunday and Monday. King City fire department used loudspeakers Sunday to warn residents throughout the village of the urgent need to save water.

night reported on a meeting held earlier in Thornhill with representatives of the Towns of Markham and Vaughan and Deputy Transport Minister Harold Gilbert.

The ministry presented three alternatives — scheme 'A' for seven lanes including two for parking within the curbs — scheme 'B' for seven lanes with the curbs moved in — and scheme 'C' for five lanes with the centre lane a permanent left turn lane, said the mayor. Schiller reported he had given Richmond Hill's position that seven lanes was much too wide a system and that there already is a problem of funneling into Richmond Hill. He requested further modifications to scheme 'C', so the left turn lane would be used only at intersections and that bus bays be included.

Rowe differs
Regional Councillor Gordon Rowe said in previous presentations by the ministry of transportation and communications he preferred scheme 'A' because it would serve the people who have to go to work in Toronto every day to the best advantage. He said present conditions create a bottleneck.

"The MTC's solution to that bottleneck is to tear down most of the buildings

and do away with the trees through Thornhill," the mayor said.

However, Regional Councillor Mrs. Lois Hancey could not recall any third alternative being suggested to Richmond Hill at previous meetings.

"The difference between schemes 'A' and 'B' were the reverse shoulders, which would have to be paved at some time anyway and it would be cheaper to do it in the first place.

"We also asked for walkways, either over or under Yonge Street, and sidewalks to be included in the design. I gave my commitment to

scheme 'A' subject to crosswalks, but do not recall any mention of scheme 'C', said Hancey.

Rowe agreed with her. "I think it would be quite feasible and plausible to invite representatives of the MTC to Richmond Hill to put on a presentation of these three alternatives for the benefit of the whole council," Mrs. Hancey suggested.

"If they will settle for five lanes, we should have them up here and also find out from the province where the cars are going to be able to travel if not on Yonge Street."

Hill council asks Yonge study stop

Learning through Mayor David Schiller that representatives of the ministry of transportation and communications would attend a meeting of the Region of York engineering committee January 16 to announce its decision to proceed with Scheme A (seven lanes) for the reconstruction of Yonge Street from Steeles Avenue to Markham Road, Richmond Hill Council Monday night asked for time in which to be made fully aware of all the implications of the proposed reconstruction.

The motion, which Regional Councillor Gordon Rowe promised to take to the Thursday meeting, asked the ministry and the Region of York to defer any approval of a particular scheme until Richmond Hill council has

had the opportunity to evaluate the three proposals.

Last October Richmond Hill Council favored Scheme A, with modifications including over or under pedestrian walks. But according to Regional Councillors Lois Hancey and Gordon Rowe, they were not advised that a third alternative which would be only five lanes wide existed.

However, Rowe and Councillor William Corcoran expressed their continued support of Scheme A.

Council also approved an appeal for representatives of the Ministry of Transportation and Communications to meet with Richmond Hill council to outline the three schemes of reconstruction of Yonge Street.

Fire marshal probes Vaughan Town blaze

The Fire Marshal's office is investigating a fire at the home of Leslie Mitchell, Concession 2, Vaughan. The blaze broke out about 1:35 pm Thursday last week. The alarm was turned in by Police Constable William Miller, who noticed smoke coming from the house.

Vaughan Fire Department answered the call. But due to the condition of the laneway leading to the house, firefighters were forced to run the hoses 500

feet from the truck to the dwelling. The fire, which is believed to have started in an unattended woodstove, caused about \$10,000 damage to the house and \$3,000 to the contents.

In Richmond Hill an early-morning fire, Monday caused an estimated \$1,500 damage to the roof of Oxford Picture Frame, 278 Newkirk Road.

Children's Aid strike looms at Orange Home

No talks between child care workers and the Loyal True Blue and Orange Home, located in the north end of Richmond Hill on Yonge Street, have been held since December 16, according to Kelvin Kaufman union representative.

The Federation of Children's Aid Staffs, which represents about 12 full-time and about five part-time workers at the home, is seeking its first contract. Bargaining began last October.

The home has applied for conciliation but because of a "large backlog" it will

likely be the end of this month before a conciliator is appointed, Kaufman believes.

If a conciliator feels the parties are too apart to reach an agreement he usually recommends that no conciliation board be appointed. A further 16 days after that the union can legally strike or management can lock out its workers.

In the meantime the union plans to picket the Orange Lodge's Toronto headquarters to protest against stalled bargaining and for information purposes.
