Woodbridge druggist named conservation authority chairman

Woodbridge pharmacist R. Grant Henderson has been appointed chairman of the Metropolitan Toronto and Region Conservation Authority, it was announced last week by Ontario Premier William Davis. Henderson succeeds Fred

Wade of Toronto, who has been chairman for the past two years.

The new chairman is a member of the authority, appointed by the Regional Municipality of York. Having jurisdiction over all the watersheds in a 1,000-square mile area, the authority has representatives from six municipalities — the Regions of Durham, York, Peel, Metropolitan and the Townships of Adjala and Mono.

Henderson served for 13 years on the Village of Woodbridge council, which appointed him in 1948 to the Humber Valley Conservation Authority. He was elected chairman in 1956.

When the Metropolitan Toronto and Region Conservation Authority was formed one year later, he was elected chairman of the flood control and water conservation advisory board and a member of the executive committee of the authority. He held this position until 1970.

In 1971 he was elected vice-chairman of the authority and re-elected in 1972, 73 and 74.

He has been the owner of Henderson Drug Store in Woodbridge for the past 38 years.
