
Breathe deeply

## Vaughan senior citizen housing to be studied

An investigation of the need for senior citizen housing in Vaughan and consideration of direct involvement by the municipality was advocated by council meeting incommittee Monday.

Council was told nonprofit organizations interested in providing senior citizen housing can get 90 percent of the funds for land and buildings from the Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation.

## Seek lower arena rates

Three groups using Woodbridge Arena appeared before Vaughan council committee Monday to request either lower ice rental fees or a higher subsidy from the town.

Nort Johnson of Woodbridge, who is involved with the Pinewood Girls Hockey league, told council the groups feel registration fees are high enough, yet deficits are increasing and organizers are becoming increasingly involved in fund-raising activities.

In a brief to council, it was pointed out the prime time rate of \$30 per hour (for evenings and weekends) is higher than nearby arenas. Bolton charges \$25 at all times: Nobleton, \$15 week nights and \$25 weekends; Clarkson, \$23 before midnight and \$18 after; and Oakville \$17 for house league, \$22.50 for rep teams. Daytimes during the week Woodbridge arena costs \$25 per hour.

The Woodbridge and District Minor Hockey Association with 314 members, charges a \$20 registration fee. The Woodbridge Figure Skating Club, with 200 members, charges \$35 for recreational skaters, \$55 for intermediates and \$60 for seniors. Despite a \$15 grant from the town for each member, both predicted an annual deficit of approximately \$5,000.

Before a committee was struck to investigate the request, Councillor Ab Hollingshead said fees should be raised \$5 and the town should agree to cover only half the estimated deficit.

Though councillors expressed reservations about the town attempting to develop and manage such a project, it was decided an investigation should be undertaken immediately.

"It should be done pronto," said Mayor Garnet Williams. "It has been hanging fire for a devil of a long time.'

A staff report noted that there have been periodic requests for such housing, surveys and discussions with various government authorities, "but there is not concrete indication of any project proceeding."

According to the report, response to two surveys on the demand for housing provided under the Ontario Housing Corporation has been low.

"It would almost appear that many people are reluctant to complete the questionnaire indicating any need for senior citizens' accommodation which does reflect a distorted concept to the actual need," the report stated.

Councillor Ab Hollingshead said there is a long waiting list for the 18 units in Woodbridge provided by Ontario Housing.

Rather than having the municipality take on the responsibility of providing housing, when Ontario Housing already has the staff and know-how, Councillor Jim Cameron suggested a public information campaign should be launched to make senior citizens aware of what is available.

Before the municipality could acquire land for housing itself, it would have to submit to the ministry of housing a statement of general housing aims.

The merits of making such a policy statement are to be studied.






