### \$1,000,000 sewage treatment plant bid

Construction of a \$1,000,000 sewage treatment facility at Holland Landing has been approved by the engineering committee of York Regional Council.

At its regular meeting last week, the committee accepted the lowest construction tender of \$843,817 from G.C. Romano Sons (Toronto) Limited for the building of a sewage lagoon, pumping station and force-main which will take one year to complete.

The committee's recommendation to proceed with construction will now go before next Thursday's regional council meeting.

Nine companies tendered for the job, with the second lowest being \$120,200 higher than the Romano company bid. The highest tender was listed at \$1,547,457.00.

Engineering Commissioner Robert Hodgson told the committee the

estimated cost of \$1,084,900 was based on a recommended tender of \$831,457, land costs of \$100,000, interim financing costs of \$50,000, and engineering and contingencies of \$94,438.

Provincial grants He said grants of \$162,700 from the province and \$153,700 from Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation would reduce the net estimated cost to \$768,500.

This must be approved by the Township of East Gwillimbury.

The awarding of the contract is further based on receiving approval from the Municipal Board.

### Newmarket separate elementary school planned

A six-pack relocatable elementary school is planned by York Region Roman Catholic Separate School Board for the Schickedanz Subdivision in Newmarket to relieve long-standing problems in that area.

The new school is planned to accommodate children in grades 1 to 6 on the west side of the CN tracks.

The school will include the six-pack plus the three portables now at Notre Dame School. These will also be moved to the site.

Kindergarten pupils from the area will continue to be accommodated at St. John's School, also on the west side. Projected enrolment would be 210.

Grades 7 and 8 pupils from the area would continue to attend Notre Dame School.

This would mean Notre Dame would become a complete kindergarten to grade 8 school within the existing building and special education would have a regular classroom instead of the staff room being used now.

Its pupils will come from the area of town east of the railway plus the grade 7 and

8 students from the west, for a total of 385.

A permanent school is planned for the Schickedanz site in 1976. The relocatable school, it was explained by Director of Education John Zupancic, will provide a solution to

existing problems and also prove the need for a permanent school.

The trustees were asked to come up with suggestions for a name for the new school and Newmarket trustee Ivan St. John commented, with a chuckle,

St. John. Another trustee suggested St. Ivan.
