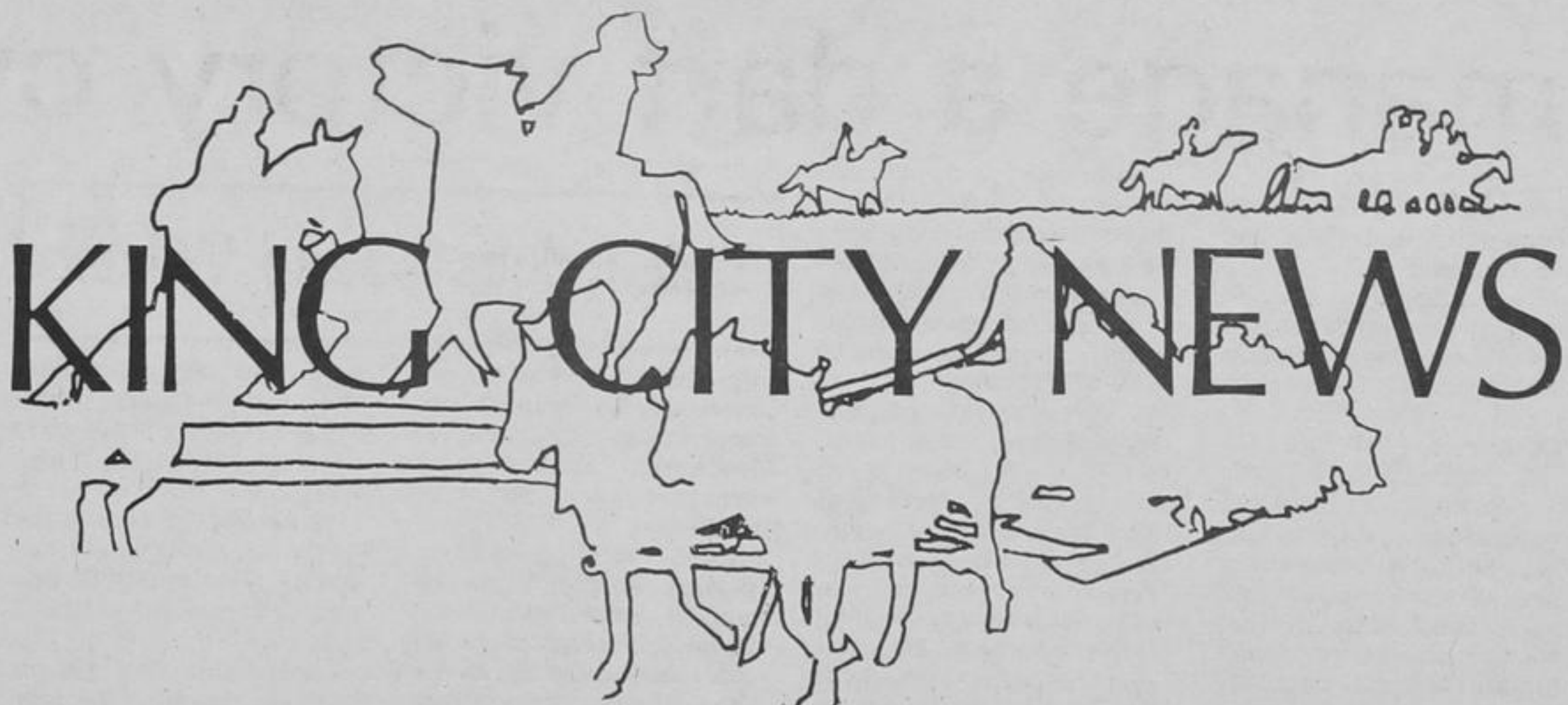
Mrs. Lance Beath of Toronto spent the weekend at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Wilfred James and family.

There is still time to see the exhibition of Tibetan Prints at the King Library, lower room. This exhibition is circulated by the Extension Department of the Art Gallery of Ontario. Perhaps the most interesting of these black and white prints is the "Wheel of Life". This is a pictorial and symbolic representation used in Tibetan Buddhism to illustrate the states of rebirth and conditions that give rise to them. At death the mind enters the state called Bardo in which one's own mental projections appear as hallucinations. When an emotion so violent or obsessive that it absorbs the mind occurs, rebirth takes place. There are six states of birth, which, for convenience and simplicity, are regarded as sharply defined and mutually exclusive.

11.14 as the Gospel. Did you know that the word Lent comes from the "lengthening" of the days in the Spring season?

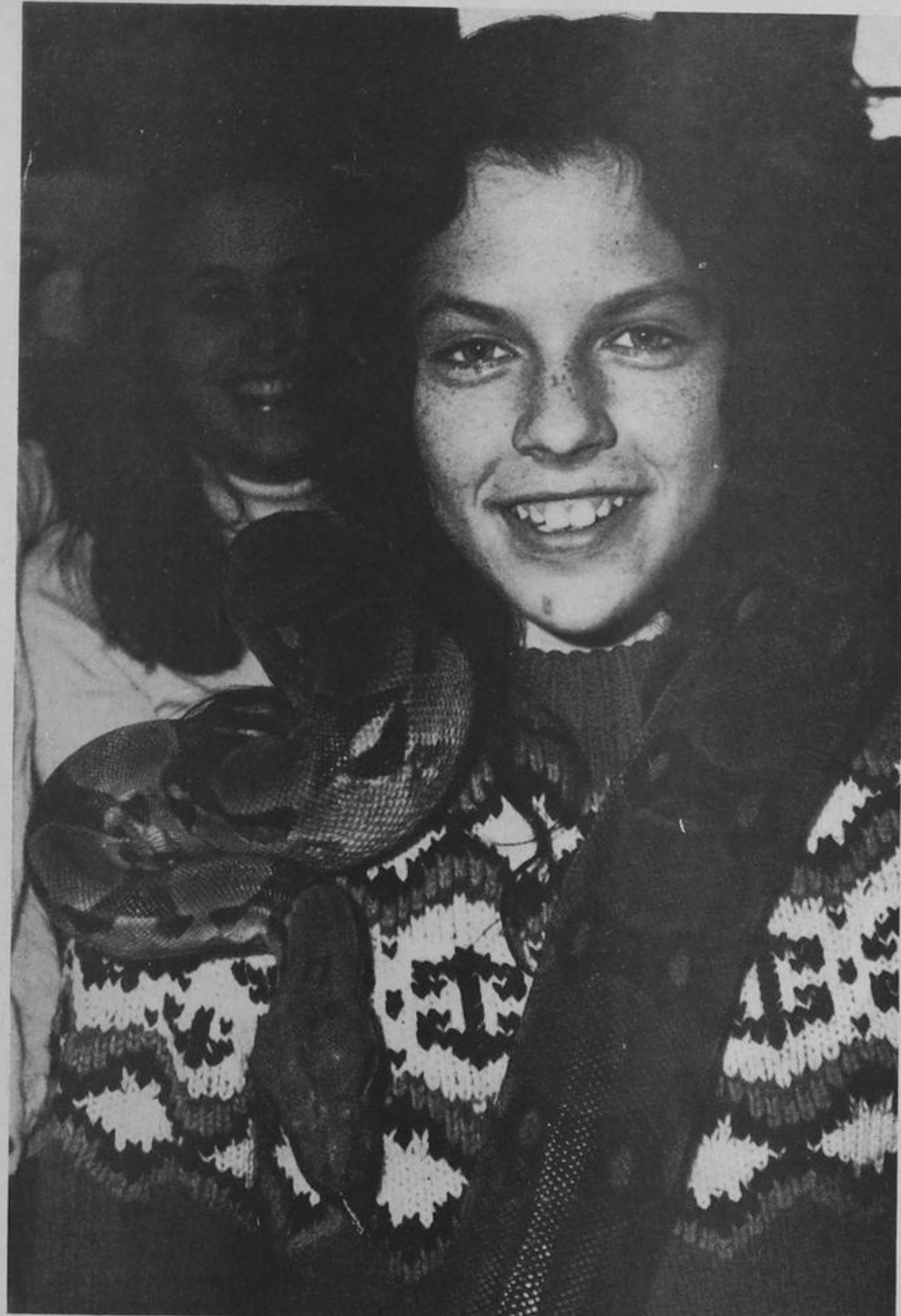
This evening at All Saint's the second in a series of interesting films will be presented entitled Right Here, Right Now, a film on social isolation. Coffee will be served afterwards.
