Two months ago I wrote an article about my eightyear-old daughter being short-changed at a local convenience store and the subsequent happenings. 1 invited readers who had had similar problems to contact me and had a lot of phone calls. Some people had had trouble themselves or else their children had; others had been in the store when a distasteful incident had occurred.

I compiled a list of people who had complaints and what those complaints were. I then phoned the head office and asked what they would

do about these problems. I was assured that someone would be in touch. Several days later, a Mr. MacDonald, supervisor for this area, called me. I told him my story. He promised to come and talk things over. Several weeks later, just before Christmas and after more phone calls by

When I asked him what he had in mind he said he would show the store manager the list of complaints and "see what he

had to say". Despite several phone calls to the head office I heard nothing further and neither did any of the people whose names appeared on the complaints list.

#### Retired minister dies in Schomberg

Our sympathy is extended to the family and friends of the late Rev. Frank Vale Abbott, DD, who passed away at his home in Schomberg February 21.

Born in Upper Norwood, England, February 8, 1886, during Queen Victoria's rule, he was ordained into the priesthood in 1913. Immigrating to Western Canada he remained there until he accepted a position at St. John's Anglican Church, West Toronto, in

From 1935 until 1952, during which time World War II came and went, he was the rector of Lloydtown Parish which included clerical duties for St. Mary Magdalene Church, Schomberg; Christ Church, Kettleby; and St. Alban's Church, Nobleton. At one time there was an Episcopal Church in Lloydtown, but only a cairn now marks the

The funeral service was held February 25 at St. Mary's, Schomberg. Officiants were Bishop Hunt and Rev. Arthur Allerton. The 90th Psalm was read by Father Arthur McMahon of St. Patrick's Roman Catholic Church in Schomberg. Burial site was the Lloydtown Cemetery in the historical hamlet founded around the year 1800 by Jesse Lloyd, a lieutenant of William Lyon Mackenzie during the 1837 Rebellion.

Rev. Abbott was the beloved husband of the late Margaret Laycock and Jerrine Kinton; and father of Kathleen, Edwin, Harold, Margaret and Helen.,

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
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
