

4 Hill teams in Newmarket loop

Senior soccer season opens Saturday

The 1975 Newmarket and District Soccer League will be dominated — in number if not necessarily in strength — by no less than four senior clubs from Richmond Hill when the season opens next Saturday.

Returning to the fold in the 10-club first division will be the mainstay Richmond Hill Rangers and their arch rivals of the past few seasons, Richmond Hill United. Other teams in that first division are Aurora Rangers, Aurora United, Barrie City, Bayview Thistle, Collingwood Pottery, Kleinberg, Newmarket Athletics, and Orangeville.

Open Saturday
The Rangers open their schedule next Saturday at 6 pm against Barrie City at Pearson Park while Richmond Hill United is host to

Kleinberg at Bayview Secondary School at 6 pm.

In the second division will be another two Richmond Hill teams including the fledgling Richvale Nationals comprising mainly "former players of the local minor soccer association most of whom will be in their early 20's" according to club organizer and secretary Ian Kernohan. They will be joined by the Richmond Hill United's second team.

Other teams in that division are Aurora Hellenics, Bradford Internationals, Bradford United, Newmarket Nationals, Newmarket Wanderers, Orillia Twin Lakers, Orillia City, and Woodbridge.

Richvale will open at home to Orillia Twin Lakers

at 6 pm at Langstaff Secondary School while the United's second team goes at the same time in Aurora.

Hopes are high
Rangers' spokesman Tom Young is looking forward to "a highly successful season. We've lost some players to other teams but we have a number of veterans returning. I think we'll do all right, we'll be competitive."

Among those players dotting the lineup will be such names as Goalie Ron Binsell, John White, right half and captain; Jim Leitch, centre-half, Andy Godschalk, centre-forward; and Mike Redlarski, fullback.

Also joining the team will be Goalie Jerry Spencer from Paisley, Scotland, and Norm Taylor from England. "All the teams play a good

calibre of ball," said Young. "They pay to play and that's an indication of how keen they are."

Andrew Graham of the Richmond Hill United teams is also enthusiastic about the coming season.

Lot of players
"We found there were so many players in the area wanting to come out for our big team that we decided to create a second one."

Comprising the first team will be such familiar names as Goalie John Slawson, Ivan Brown, centre forward; John Byrne, outside right; Richard Simpson, wing half; and Dave Simpson, outside left. Among the new names will be Dez Arneil, of Ireland, at outside right. Manager of the team is Mickey Murphy.

No miracles here
Ian Kernohan of the Richvale Nationals is not looking for any "miracles." He just hopes to be competitive. "My idea was to give some

younger players who are graduates of the Richmond Hill minor soccer system a chance to continue their soccer playing. I saw there were a lot of players who simply had to drop out after

finishing their minor soccer days." But Kernohan is also realistic when he states "that it could be a pretty rough season but I'm hoping for the best."

Rough?
He also means "rough" in the sense that the team hasn't even got its sweaters yet.

"We've ordered them but the likelihood is that we'll play our first few games in T-shirts."

Kernohan is still looking for a sponsor for the team but admits "we haven't found much interest."

Financing of the team has been eked out via a "couple

of donations" and registration fees plus material assistance such as goalposts from the Richmond Hill Minor Soccer Association.

Some of the names in his lineup will include brother Tom Kernohan in goal; Mike Parker, second half; Jim Brand, outside right; George Barr, left half; and Tim Whelan, centre forward.

Coach of the team will be Ian's father, Jack Kernohan.

Hill minor soccer opens on May 20
