On May 11 there will be two showings, 1:30 and 3:30 pm, of Promised Lands, (France, 1974) in English, Director Susan Sontag.

The powerful color experiments of Matisse, Derain, Dufy, Vlaminck and others earned them the soubriquet of the fauves, the wild beasts, at the Autumn Salon in Paris, 1905. Paintings by 10 important artists of the fauve movement will be on display until May 11.

Also concluding May 11, Selections from the Canadian Historical Collection, paintings and sculpture covering 150 years of Canadian art.

Dr. Morissette discusses use of sun in pictures

Thirty members of York Regional Camera Club enjoyed an excellent slide display and discussion by local physician Dr. Yves Morissette.

His subject, the sun, as shown in his slides, displayed some unique approaches to utilizing the sun in pictures.

The typical sunrises and sunsets always make outstanding photographs.

The technique of hiding the full brilliance of the sun behind buildings or trees and stopping the camera down gives some unusual effects. Dr. Morissette also talked

about other sources of light — fire, night light, natural and indoor light, bounce light and moonlight.

Criticism is always important in competition work since it allows the photographer an insight into how others view his work.

Mushroom and spinach crepes lovely spring luncheon dish

A lovely luncheon dish with the taste of spring.

1 pint (1/2 pound) mushrooms
1 10-ounce bag fresh spinach
2 tablespoons cooking oil or butter
1/2 teaspoon salt
Black Pepper to taste
Dash cayenne pepper (careful here!)
Cream
12 5-inch crepes (very thin pancakes, cooked)
Parmesan cheese

Wipe mushrooms with a damp cloth and trim off dried stem end. Chop finely.

In a large skillet saute mushrooms in oil or butter over moderate heat, about five minutes.

Meantime wash spinach leaves, cook in water clinging to leaves in a tightly covered pot. Drain well, chop finely.

Combine mushrooms and spinach. Season to taste.

Carefully add a teaspoon or two of cream, just enough to bind the mushroom mixture.

Divide the mixture roughly into 12 equal portions. Spread each portion over one third of each pancake or crepe. Roll up and place seam side down in a shallow oven proof dish.

Sprinkle with parmesan cheese. Place under broiler to lightly brown. Serves four.

NOTE: Crepes may be made from your own recipe or a pancake mix. Success depends on the thinness of the batter.

They may be made ahead of time and stored in the refrigerator, or for longer storage, in the freezer.

Place waxed paper bet-

ween each crepe for storing. Reheat in the oven before filling.

For a dinner vegetable, cook together one 10-ounce can mushrooms and one package of frozen peas.

Place vegetables in a warm serving dish thicken mushroom liquid with a little corn starch, season to taste, and serve over mushrooms and peas.
