"Mariposa" makes point

"Mariposa," home of Stephen Leacock, who offered many a sage comment on the times, puts forth its own commentary on contemporary issues with its release on the coming Mariposa Folk Festival, to be held at Toronto Islands, June 20 to 22.

In its advance of the 15th annual event, the festival authorities, in big, bold type, explain to prospective ticket purchasers in both the U.S. and Canada that, in the event of a mail strike, tickets can still be obtained.

Four locations
For people across the border, a post box has been secured in Buffalo, New York, while in Toronto, tickets may be obtained at four different locations.

There is also a Montreal listing. Other locations in Canada are asked to wire the money, as originally set out, to Mariposa Folk Festival, 329 St. George Street, Suite 4, Toronto, M5R 2R2.

That latter address still stands now, as possibilities of a mail strike seem to have disappeared.

The festival features folk music, dance and crafts from 10 a.m. daily to 8:30 p.m.

Local song stylist has hopes of hit

Peter Logue of 302 Axminster Drive in Richmond Hill, has his fingers crossed these days that a song he wrote recently may be soon on its way to becoming a hit.

Logue, who arrived from Scotland 13 weeks ago, wrote "Anne Marie" and, according to word from Major Label Records in Hollywood, it is being considered for commercial recording and national promotion in an album called Hit Sounds of Today.

The company said it would be shipped from coast to coast to disc jockeys, radio stations and record stores.

Dispels rumor

Logue also recently completed another song, but was upset about a rumor from Scotland surrounding it. According to a Scottish newspaper, Paul Anka was promoting it.

That wasn't true, Logue said, and expressed concern that the story might jeopardize any future chances he might have with the song.

Logue, who is working on other songs, is at present employed with Wymac Construction.

Region non-union staff appeals 1975 salaries

York Regional Council's administrative committee last week heard submissions from 15 non-union employees who are appealing the 1975 salaries set by council earlier in the year.

The committee, which is acting as grievance committee, is made up of York's nine mayors.

The committee will hear from 15 more employees, who are acting as spokesmen for groups of their fellow employees, and also from department heads, May 20.

The employees feel they were discriminated against because council didn't give them the same 6 percent July 1 cost-of-living raise received by the Canadian Union of Public Employees for workers in the health unit and York Manor Home for the Aged.

They would also like additional mileage allowance and pension benefits.

Non-union staff salary increases amounted to an average of 15.7 percent, compared with union increases from 17 to 24 percent.
