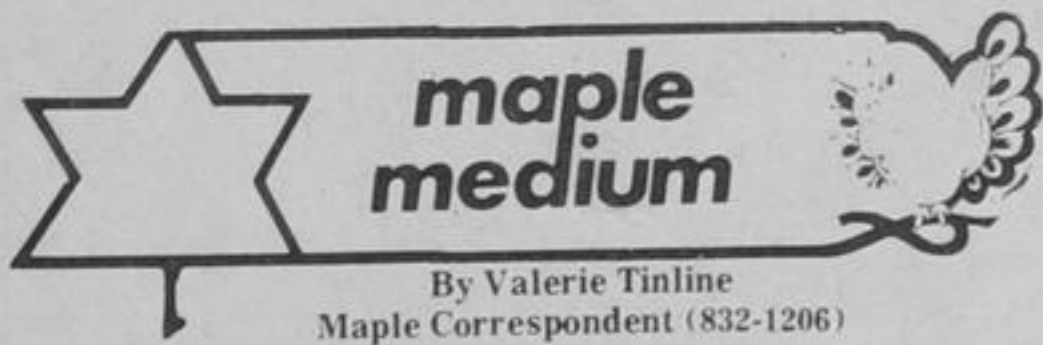


## M.A.D. asked for alternatives to dumping

### Auxiliary celebrates anniversary

The original Women's Auxiliary of St. Stephen's Anglican Church, Maple, was formed in the early 1870's.

At that time the church stood on Langstaff Road where a cairn has been erected to mark the old cemetery.

The land for 'old' St. Stephen's was granted by Michael Keffer in either 1836 or 37 (Reference: G. Elmer Reaman's History of Vaughan Township.) The present church in Maple was opened in 1895.

Last Wednesday evening the women of the church gathered, as they do each June, to celebrate the beginnings of that original group.

It was a happy group, who enjoyed ice cream, strawberries and a festive cake in the rectory.

"Suggest alternatives" a Vaughan councillor told Maple Against Dumping representative John Becker last week.

Appearing before a committee meeting to reaffirm the group's opposition to landfill operations north east of Maple, Mr. Becker was told by Councillor Terry Goodwin, "The fastest way to get rid of something is to suggest something more practical."

Mr. Becker said he would take the comment to his group but said he would prefer to see the gravel quarry sites used for large-lot residences or recreation.

"Our group feels there is sufficient material, if moved around on the site, to make use of the land," said Becker. "We believe the trucking of clean fill or dirty fill is not necessary."

At the recent annual meeting of the Maple Ratepayers' Association, of which M.A.D. is a sub-committee, opposition to landfill operations in Maple was reconfirmed, Becker said.

**Major objections**  
The group's major objections to such operations relate to truck traffic, possible injurious effects on area ground water supplies and a more general concern for the issue of energy conservation and recycling.

### Youths confirmed by Anglican scholar

Confirmed at St. Stephen's Anglican Church, Maple, June 8 were Thomas Studdy of Keele Street, John Young of Naylon Street, Renee and Fiona Hayes of Major Mackenzie Drive, Amanda Matthews of Keele Street and Janice Matchett of Keele Street.

The confirming Bishop was the Right Reverend William R. Coleman.

Bishop Coleman is recognized as one of the leading scholars in the Anglican Church of Canada. Early in his vocation he was appointed Head of Theological Studies in Bishop's University in the Province of Quebec, then Principal of Huron College in the University of Western Ontario.

Later he served as the Bishop of Kootenay over a wide area in British Columbia.

Now Bishop Coleman is Professor in Philosophy and the Humanities at York University, where reports have it that his lectures are of such interest that his classes have been known to outstay their period by a full hour.

### A lot of chicken

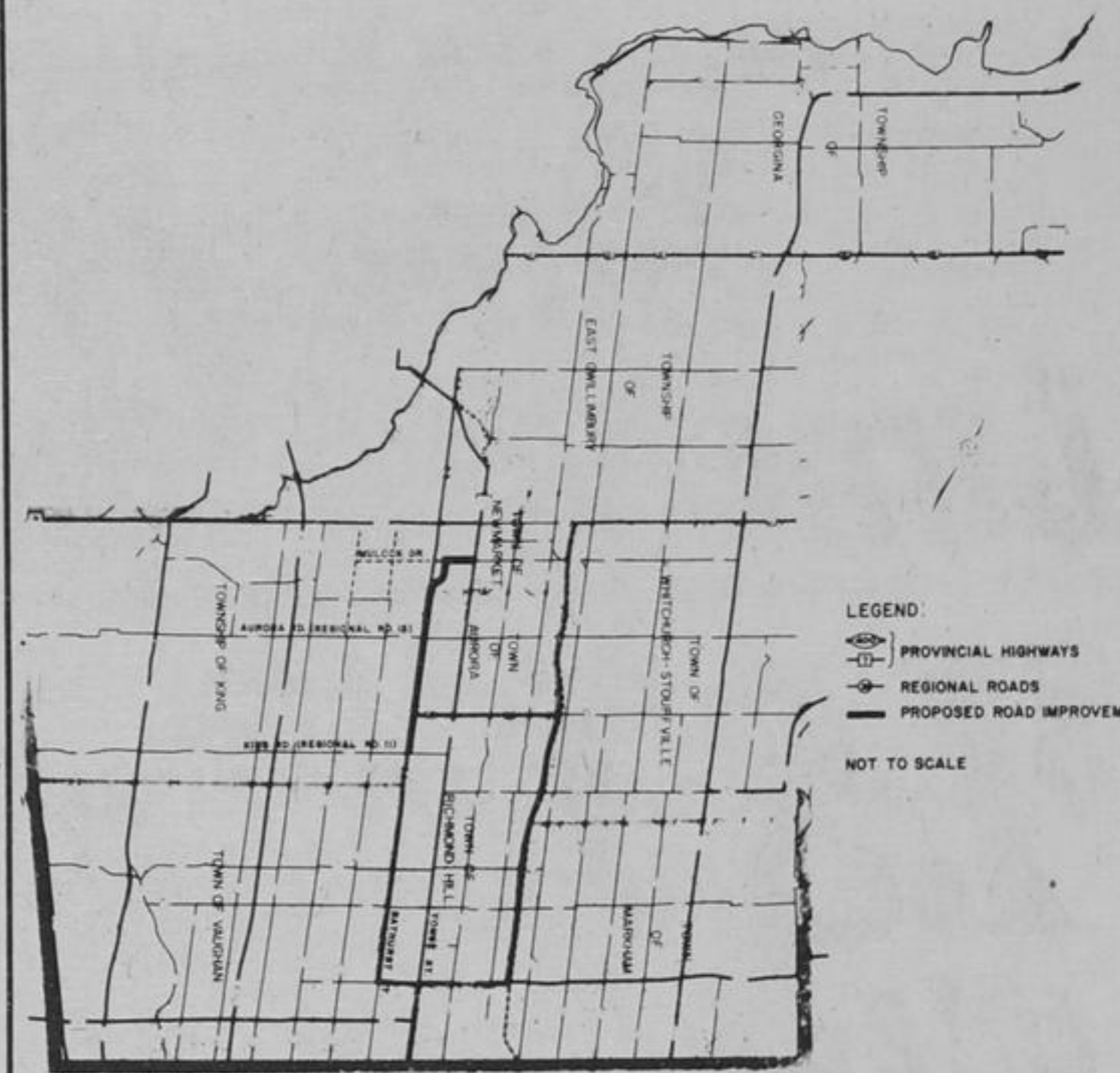
The tempting smell of barbecue chicken filled the air near Maple last Thursday and Lions Club members served approximately 1,000

## The Regional Municipality of York Notice of Information Centre PROPOSED BATHURST STREET IMPROVEMENT FROM KING ROAD TO MULOCK DRIVE

Proposals for the improvement of Bathurst Street from King Road to Mulock Drive are currently under consideration by The Regional Municipality of York. These proposals are the result of recently completed studies and investigation for Bathurst Street.

The section of Bathurst Street to be improved is shown on the key map. Improvement for a section of Mulock Drive west of Yonge Street is also proposed. These improvements are necessary to provide adequate travel service in the area, now and in the future.



THE REGIONAL MUNICIPALITY OF YORK

Two Study Reports covering the proposed road improvements may be reviewed at Public Libraries in Newmarket, Aurora, Richmond Hill, Holland Landing and King City. The reports are titled as follows:

Bathurst Street — Regional Road No. 38 from King Road to Aurora Road — Functional Design Report — and —

Bathurst Street — Regional Road No. 38 from Aurora Road to Highway No. 11 — Feasibility Study

## If you are 65 or older and have lived here for the past year, most prescription drugs can be free.

### This is what Ontario is doing for you to get them.



#### Ontario residents not receiving Old Age Security.

If you are 65 or older, and have lived in Ontario for at least the past year but less than 10 years, you too are entitled to Ontario's prescription drug benefits. But because we don't know who you are, you'll have to apply for the drug benefit card — at your pharmacy or from the Ministry of Health. After you're enrolled, you'll automatically receive your drug benefit card.

#### Here's how Drug Benefit works.

There are more than 1,500 prescription drugs listed in the Ministry of Health's Drug Benefit Formulary. When you visit a physician or dentist, tell him you qualify for the Drug Benefit so that he can prescribe medication from the Formulary. Then, give your Drug Benefit Card to the pharmacist. Your pharmacy will keep your card. But you can have it returned — in case you move or want to go to a different pharmacy.

#### No cost to you.

When you get your prescription, you pay nothing. The pharmacist will be paid by your Ontario government.

In Ontario, we wish you the best of health. And we're doing something about it. So if you need to apply (and most people don't), pick up your Drug Benefit application form at your pharmacy, or write to:

Effective August 1, we have a new law in Ontario. It will allow almost everyone who is 65 or older and has been an Ontario resident for at least the past 12 months to receive most prescription drugs free.

That means prescriptions written by physician or dentist and filled in Ontario. Only those drugs listed in Ontario's Drug Benefit Formulary are free. Here is who is eligible:

#### Ontario residents who receive Old Age Security.

If you are 65 or older and are presently receiving an Old Age Security cheque from the federal government, you will automatically receive your new Drug Benefit Eligibility Card before August 1. (And, of course, if you are already getting a drug benefit card, you will continue to get one.) You don't have to do anything about it.
