## \$1,054,133 Bathurst job

York Regional Council accepted the tender of McKay Excavating Limited of \$1,054,133 for reconstruction of Bathurst Street, between Elgin Mills Road and King Road.

Other costs will bring the total to \$1,203,133, still well below the estimated \$1,520,000.

This prompted Richmond Hill Mayor David Schiller to predict the region would have a fat surplus in 1976.

Road costs seemed to be running below estimates, he said. "We can all look forward to a huge surplus next year."

Earlier this year, the tender for reconstruction of the King Road between Highway 400 in King City and Jane Street, was some \$400,000 below estimates.

## It's cherry pitting time so bake yourself a cake

For just three weeks a year—and it will be from July 7 to 31 this year—you'll be able to buy and enjoy a beautiful Ontario fruit crop—sweet cherries.

A bumper crop is expected this year, and while everybody loves to eat cherries out of the hand, food specialists at the Ontario Food Council, Ministry of Agriculture and Food have prepared this simple, delicious recipe for folks who like to cook with them, too.

### Quick Cherry Upside-Down Cake

1½ cups pitted fresh, sweet Ontario cherries  
1 tbs lemon juice  
2 tbs maraschino cherry juice or fruit juice  
¼ cup sugar  
1¼ cups unsifted pastry flour  
¼ tsp salt  
2 tsp baking powder  
½ cup sugar  
¼ cup soft shortening  
½ cup milk  
1 tsp vanilla  
1 egg

Arrange cherries, cut side up, in well-buttered 8-inch square pan. Sprinkle with lemon juice, fruit juice and ¼ cup sugar.

Sift flour, salt, baking

powder and ½ cup sugar into a small bowl; add shortening, milk and vanilla. Beat slowly with wooden spoon until blended. Scrape the bowl and drop in the egg. Beat for ½ minute until smooth.

Spoon and spread over cherries; bake at 350 degrees F. for about 35 minutes or until cake is set. Cut around the edge and invert. Serve warm with soft ice cream. Makes 6 to 8 servings.
