Eversley fair Saturday

The King Township Historical Society has decided to hold an annual event each year in different parts of the township in order to focus attention, historically, on King's colorful past.

For two years the society held the successful "Lloydtown Rebellion Day" — it will be held again, sometime in the near future, but not this year.

Instead, the KTHS is creating an "historic happening" centred around the "Old Stone Church of Scotland", St. Andrew's of Eversley. In keeping with Scottish tradition a "ceilidh" (a gaelic word pronounced kaylee) is being presented in the old church building. It is a program of highland hospitality, of song, dance, skits and music.

Old time fair

An old time 1848 country fair atmosphere will be going on outside the church — with lots of good

pioneer food, displays of handicrafts, weaving, caning, etc.

An auction of fresh produce from the fertile lands of King will also be held. Also to be auctioned off are odds and ends of pioneer artifacts donated by the community and members.

Square dancing demonstrations will be held outdoors as well and band concert music, interspersed with the haunting strains of the bagpipes, will fill the air.

Free admission

Admission to persons in costume is free, other adults will pay a fee of \$1 with children being admitted without charge. The activities start at 11 a.m. and will continue until 6 p.m.

Construction of the historic church building was the work of the people of the congregation themselves, beginning in 1843 and completing their back-breaking labors in 1848. When the congregations of

Eversley and Strange amalgamated in 1958, the building was deconsecrated and closed.

To save it from the wreckers' hammers, Lady Eaton with rare understanding of the faith and courage commemorated within its stout walls, purchased the church in 1960 to preserve it for posterity.

Eaton endowment

The church was financially endowed by Lady Eaton and entrusted to the care of the York Pioneer Society.

Last year the King Township Historical Society obtained its custodianship and will spend the proceeds of next Saturday's Eversley Fair on restoring the building with loving care.

The church will continue to serve the community as an all-denominational church, wedding chapel and meeting hall, continuing the traditions and hospitality of the early settlers.
