

# Man does not live by bread alone

Just prior to the Ontario Elections in September, St. John's Baptist Church in Richmond Hill invited the three candidates for election to come for coffee and a chat.

We were honored that Tony Roman, Tony Snekter and Alf Stong accepted the invitation to be present. The invitation was extended because it was felt that Christian faith too often becomes fragmented and unrelated to life. It was a very refreshing experience for all who attended.

The fragmentation of human life, into mind and heart, into soul and body, is a matter of convenience for discussion rather than fact. To deal with a woman, say, as a mother while not dealing with her as a wife, or to consider her as a political person unrelated to her as a church member is false. All aspects of a person are part of one and the same person. The "all-or-none" principle works here. You remember it — "Touch a person one place and you touch him everywhere". So the Christian person is a Christian in all phases of life, at all times and in all places.

"Keep religion out of economics, business, trade and commerce," the cry goes out! But the man who lives by bread alone is surely a sadder and poorer person. Indeed, the Christian Gospel helps folks come to grips with the truth that "man does not live by bread alone (economics) but by every word which proceeds from the mouth of God". Economics, business, if you will, is part of our daily expression of one's love for God and his fellow men.

"Don't mix Christianity and politics", the minister is often advised. But politics is the science and art of government; the beings governed are the people; and a Christian unconcerned

with politics is a Christian unconcerned with people at the very point where they can often be hurt or helped.

Task worthwhile So the Christian Church's task is to — I quote another — "feed the intellect, stir the emotions, quicken the spirit, and commission the body". It is a big job, but a worthwhile one. The fact is that, if our basic assumption is correct, viz., that life cannot be compartmentalized but is a sacred whole, then the task of the Christian Church is to proclaim the whole Christ for the whole of mankind in the whole of the world.

At the beginning of our Lord's ministry, he set the unlimited boundaries

of his task while among men. Addressing the folk in his own home town of Nazareth, he read from Isaiah the following words:

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me because He has anointed me; He has sent me to announce good news to the poor.

To proclaim release for prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind; To let the broken victims go free.

To proclaim the year of the Lord's favor." Surely this sets forth the task of the Christian community. It is a high and holy task! Let the Church proclaim the whole of Christ for the whole of man in the whole of the world.
