

### Man, it's wildlife



Wildlife areas Distributed throughout southern Ontario are 24 provincial wildlife areas, managed by the Ministry of Natural Resources to produce and preserve wildlife and to give recreational opportunities.

These areas are open year-round for hiking, dog training, archery, trap shooting, and for hunting, during the designated seasons. As we are mainly concerned here with hunting, I will attempt to outline a list of the better areas in the southern region, and regulations concerning each.

> Waterfowl Darlington Provincial Park

provides an excellent opportunity to hunt waterfowl close to the city Hunting is limited to six established blinds with a daily fee of \$4. On a 'first come - first served basis'. hunting is permitted on Mondays, Wednesdays, Fridays, and Saturdays, from one-half hour before sunrise until sunset. Boats are needed to reach all but one blind. Darlington is located south of Highway 401 just east of Oshawa.

First come

Orangeville Reservoir is located just north of Highway 9 east of Orangeville. Waterfowl hunting is limited to 12 established blinds with two hunters per blind and no fees. First come - first served basis means an early arrival time. Hunting is permitted on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Fridays

in this 450 acre area. Outboards are not permitted and only six of the blinds are accessible by foot. The parking area is on the first line in Mono Township north of Highway 9. This is a good area for Teals, Gadwalls, and several species of diving ducks.

Scugog Island includes 470 acres of top pheasant hunting located on the island in Lake Scugog. Drive three miles east of Port Perry and turn north onto the County Road 7 to the end. Hunting is permitted for pheasants from Tuesday through

Pheasants

Saturday. The fee is \$5 for two birds with a 92 percent success rate. Scugog is open for hunting nine in the morning until live in the afternoon, on a first come - first served basis. A lunch hour between 12 and 1 p.m. is enforced. See Trailblazers column for November 5 for further details on Scugog.)

Sibbald Point is located just east of Sutton north of Highway 48 and is well-marked. Birds are released as on Scugog Island and the rules and regulations are basically the same also. Arrive early as a limit of 45 hunters is allowed.

Good Woodcocks

Tiny Marsh is located west of Highway 27 north of Elmvale. This large area is open to hunters for waterfowl, pheasants and grouse, free of

Hunting is allowed from Monday to Saturday but no blinds are available. Outboard motors are prohibited in this area. The limit for pheasant is three birds and I've been told by regular Tiny Marsh hunters that there is a good Woodcock population.

Lots of fun

In all of the above-mentioned areas, the hunter must have a valid Small Game License and, if he wishes to hunt ducks, a Waterfowl license is required. Give any of the areas a try, and I am certain that you will be in for a pleasant surprise. I can't think of a better place for my tax dollar to go.
