## Disappearing species

History records John Audubon's death as 1851. Soon after 1800, Mr. Audubon wrote his account about the Passenger Pigeon which was similar to "I estimate the numbers I saw in the vast migratory flight that darkened the sky and took hours to pass, exceeded either one or two billion birds."

No other bird on this earth ever occurred in such numbers. Survival for the future was assured, especially in central Ontario hardwoods. Alton Hills and the Credit River Valley was loaded with these birds.

In 1878, 1½ million birds were shipped by railroad to markets in the United States. The last specimen was shot twenty years later in 1898. The last survivor hatched in captivity and died in a zoo in 1914 at the age of 29. The chapter on the Passenger Pigeon was now closed — forever and final.

Then there were none  
The fight for conservation of endangered species gained ground and several nonprofit organizations, as well as government institutions have taken a much harder look at our vanishing wilderness.

Unfortunately, protection of the animal itself is not enough; habitat and food supply have played a major role in the disappearance of 12

species in Canada alone. The Passenger Pigeon was followed by the Labrador Duck, Great Auk, Wild Turkey, (since reintroduced), Sea Mink, Northern Otter (also reintroduced), the Great Plains Caribou, the Queen Charlotte Island Caribou, and, finally, the Eastern Wapiti.

There are a few which are considered extinct, but with an occasional sighting, we fool ourselves by not adding the species to the extinct list. Even if there should be some authentic sightings, the numbers are so small that a successful survival is virtually non-existent.

The latter list include the Eskimo Curlew, the Plains Grizzly Bear, and the Stellar Sea Cow. Canada's list of endangered wildlife includes 13 mammals, 16 fish, 9 birds, 19 reptiles, and 9 amphibians, including salamanders, one type of toad and two species of frogs.

Sterile nests  
As recently as 1946, the late C.L. Broley, known as the Eagle Man, was writing glowing reports of the large Bald Eagle population in

Florida. One year later, he was started to find that 41 percent of the nests he examined produced no offspring.

By 1957, the failure had risen to 86 percent and now experts tell us that over 80 percent is sterile. Insecticide was blamed for this; man's hunger for food and better productivity had once again forgotten our obligation to our wildlife.

There still are good numbers of Bald Eagles in British Columbia, Alaska, and the northern parts of the Prairie Provinces, but how long will they last?

### Man may be next

In 1949, Harper Hall, a noted ornithologist, studied the Peregrine Falcon nesting on the Sun Life Building in Montreal. In 1975, it is on the Canadian endangered list, and only a few pairs exist today.

The Osprey, a fish eater, is another that is in serious trouble. Although still holding its own in some parts of its range, the numbers are dramatically declining in others.

I could add about another fifty-five names to this list now, but perhaps it will not be long before we will have to add Man to the endangered list, if we don't stop fooling around with nature. NOW, not tomorrow. Perhaps the Passenger Pigeon was trying to tell us something!
