A note giving an explanation of the purpose and effect of the by-law and stating the lands affected thereby is also furnished below.

ANY PERSONS INTERESTED MAY, within fourteen (14) days after the date of this notice, send by registered mail or deliver to the Clerk of the Town of Richmond Hill notice of objection to approval of the said by-law, together with a statement of the grounds of such objection.

ANY PERSONS wishing to support the application for approval of the by-law may within fourteen (14) days after the date of this notice send by registered mail or deliver to the Clerk of the Town of Richmond Hill notice of support of approval of the said by-law, together with a request for notice of any hearing that may be held giving also the name and address to which such notice should be given.

THE ONTARIO MUNICIPAL BOARD may approve of the said by-law but before doing so it may appoint a time and place when any objection to the by-law may be considered. Notice of any hearing that may be held will be given only to persons who have filed an objection notice of objection and who have left with or delivered to the Clerk undersigned, the address to which notice of hearing is to be sent.

WHEREAS the lands affected by this By-law were situated in the Township of King and were annexed to the Town of Richmond Hill by the Regional Municipality of York Act, 1970, but remain subject to the provisions of By-law No. 1275 of the former Township of King.

WHEREAS the matters here set out are in conformity with the Richmond Hill Official Plan which is approved and in force at this time.

AND WHEREAS there has been no objection to the Richmond Hill Official Plan proposed by the Council but not approved at this time which the matters herein set out are not in conformity.

NOW THEREFORE THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF RICHMOND HILL ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. By-law No. 1275 as amended, be and is hereby further amended by (a) Adding the following paragraph as Section 1.15.1:

"1.15.1. HIGHWAY OR STREET insofar as it affects lands situate in the Town of Richmond Hill means a road assumed by the Corporation of the Town of Richmond Hill or the Regional Municipality of York or the Province of Ontario or a road allowance upon which a road is being constructed under an agreement with the Town of Richmond Hill."

(b) Adding the following paragraph as Section 2.5:

"2.5. No building shall be erected upon any lands situate in the Town of Richmond Hill unless it is upon a lot fronting upon a highway. Notwithstanding the provisions of this Section a dwelling or accessory building thereto lawfully existing on the date of passing of By-law 85-75 of the Corporation of the Town of Richmond Hill may be repaired or enlarged if it complies with all other requirements of this By-law."
