Story of William Lyon Mackenzie

The Mackenzie House, 82 Bond Street, home of Toronto's first mayor and the leader of the Rebellion of 1837 is featuring an exhibition telling the story of William Lyon Mackenzie from the time of his arrival in Canada in 1820 until his death in 1861. Some of the original documents on display date from 1822, including the first copy of the Colonial Advocate printed by Mackenzie in Queenston in 1824. Afternoon tea is served daily in the gallery from 2 to 4 p.m. Reservations are necessary on weekends — 366-1371. Mackenzie House is open from 9:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday to Saturday, noon to 5 p.m. Sundays and holidays. Adults 50 cents, children and senior citizens 25 cents.

Puss 'n Boots

Abstracts at AGO

The first comprehensive exhibition of new and recent prints by eight important

abstract artists opened at the Art Gallery of Ontario Dec. 19 and continues to Jan. 18. Initiated and organized by the gallery, the show will travel to art centres across Canada and the United States. More than 160 prints by North American artists Mel Bochner, Sol LeWitt, Robert Mangold, Bruce Marden, Agnes Martin, Edda Renouf, Dorothea Rockburne and Robert Ryman are on exhibit.

Textiles at Museum

A collection featuring 9,000 flat textiles and 4,000 costumes and accessories including embroidery, lace and handweaving makes up an exhibit honoring the recent retirement of Katharine Brett following 25 years of service at the Royal Ontario Museum, 100 Queen's Park at Bloor Street. The exhibit reflecting the career of a curator is open 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. Tuesday to Saturday, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday, 1 to 9 p.m. Sunday to February 29.

Over Sixties enjoy Christmas panorama

Members of Elmwood Over Sixties Club in Richmond Hill have been among the thousands to enjoy this year's Christmas Panorama of lights in Simcoe.

The group assembled at Elmwood Manor Dec. 16 and boarded a Travelways bus piloted by Art Cummings for the

trip to view the show sponsored by the Simcoe Chamber of Commerce. Since the beginning in 1958, the project has grown to include more than 60 displays of fantasy, religious, Christmas and Dickens scenes.

The displays are set on islands in the river and when the lights come on at dusk it is transformed into a veritable fairyland. The reflections in the water, and the fact that a light snow was falling at the time of the local group's visit made it a perfect setting.

En route the Over Sixties visited the Lynnwood Mall near Brantford, and on their arrival at the Simcoe Community Centre the Junior Chamber of Commerce provided a delicious smorgasbord.

When they boarded the bus for the trip to the park and the light show they were joined by a tour guide. Last year over 250 bus loads of out-of-town people from Canada and the U.S. and 85,000 cars carrying 250,000 people visited the Christmas

Panorama. The official opening is Dec. 1, and the lights remain on from dusk to dawn every day for the month of December.

On the home bound trip Mr. Cummings took the bus over the mountain route through Hamilton so his passengers could enjoy the lights of that city.

Everyone joined in singing Christmas carols and old time favorites led by Mr. Cummings and tour director Louise Cooper of Maple.

The Over Sixties were grateful to Mr. Cummings for bringing them safely home through the snowstorm and to Mrs. Cooper and their own Jack Sheahan for arranging a most enjoyable outing.
