Should prohibit elevator smoking

Dear editor:
May we please have space to appeal to your readers to express their views on the question of banning smoking in elevators to their members of the Ontario Legislature.

Most people are aware the medical profession and other health agencies including government health departments are concerned over the growing hazard to health caused by second-hand smoke.

This hazard is particularly acute in elevators and among people who have asthma, emphysema and chronic bronchitis.

We feel it is not too much to ask anybody to refrain from smoking in elevators as the ride seldom takes more than a minute but the poisons emitted from cigars, pipes and cigarettes linger on for hours afterwards.

There is evidence to show asthmatic patients have suffered severe attacks after inhaling these poisons.

The Boroughs of York, East York, Scarborough, North York and Etobicoke have all agreed smoking should be banned in elevators.

But they cannot do anything about it unless and until the government of Ontario grants them permission to make the legislation.

A public expression of opinion might help the legislators to make a decision.

municipal boundaries that came six years ago. Some traditional communities straddle the new town boundaries, others are in different towns. To meet these demands the press run in 1974 was divided into two editions with four or more pages replaced. We are thus able to print a much larger volume of news each week. This allows the Richmond Hill-King area and the Markham-Vaughan area to have their own two pages of general news, their own

page of community news and their own page of sports news every week. Some news of one area is equally interesting to readers in the other, so is

run in both editions. Repeating pages for different areas involves a considerable amount of extra expense, so it must be limited if we are to continue to serve our advertisers economically and keep the selling price of the paper at the present level.—Editor)
