Hill Lions assist 1976 Olympic games

YORK REGION — Among the thousands of volunteers who will be assisting with the 1976 Olympiad For The Physically Disabled in Etobicoke Aug. 3 to 11 will be dozens of Lions from this area.

At a recent meeting of Richmond Hill Lions, the club appointed Lions Danny Boyle and Dave Barber as its representatives.

Assisting them at this important event will be as many members as are able to help at that time. Clubs from Richvale, Oak Ridges, Maple,

Victoria Square, Thornhill, will also be rallying teams of volunteers.

Some 1,700 physically handicapped athletes from 75 nations will be competing in events which include swimming, track and field, fencing, basketball, volleyball, weightlifting, table tennis, lawn bowling, archery, rifle shooting.

These international games originated at Stoke Mandeville, England, in 1952. Since 1960 they have moved every fourth year to the country which is host to the regular Olympics.

The 1976 games will, for the first time, include blind and amputee as well as wheelchair athletes.

The games were initiated by Sir Ludwig Guttmann who established the world-famed spinal injuries centre at Stoke Mandeville Hospital during World War Two.

One of his revolutionary ideas was that sport could help the handicapped put themselves back in the mainstream of life, helping to re-establish self-respect and self-discipline, encouraging them to make the most of their remaining physical capabilities.
