

Remarkable James Miles

The remarkable James Miles always conducted business on a most accommodating basis.

If a neighbor required a load of hay, he would find out the going market rate, then always charge below it.

He was also a very strong man with his muscles developed by many hours of felling trees and clearing land.

As a lieutenant in the 4th York Militia Regiment during the War of 1812 he had occasion to demonstrate his great strength when one of the men, also a very strong specimen, refused to carry out the drill orders.

When cajoling and persuasion had no effect, Miles jerked the stubborn one to the ground. After the third fall, the young man decided to obey orders and toe the line and gave no further trouble.

Sense of humor
William Harrison also reported the squire had a good sense of humor, although a quiet man with somewhat solemn ways.

He once sold a man some pigs, valued at \$25, to be paid for in shingles within six months.

A note was drawn up, the purchaser signed his name and the squire handed him the note.

When the purchaser said he was not the one who should hold the note, Miles replied, "Oh yes, you should keep it so that you will know when it comes due."

The man took it and brought the shingles on the due date.

Man of action
When someone locked the door of the church and those who came to worship in the afternoon could not gain entrance, they went to the squire.

"I will let you in," he said in his slow and deliberate manner.

On his way over to the church he picked up a stick about six feet long and a couple of inches in diameter and with this as a battering ram forced the door open.

"There," he said, "I think you can get in now."

Highway surveyor
He was a surveyor of highways for the Home District and in 1818 signed a deed conveying parts of Toronto Street in the

participant in the rebellion of 1837. Later in 1840 a large patriotic gathering was held on the spot and arrangements made for the erection of the present monument on Queenston Heights.

Last appearance
As a veteran of 1812, the aged James Miles, at-

tended this ceremony in his regimental uniform with his sword at his side, and it was to be his last public appearance.

For on the return trip to Toronto and Richmond Hill on horseback he caught a severe cold which resulted in his death.

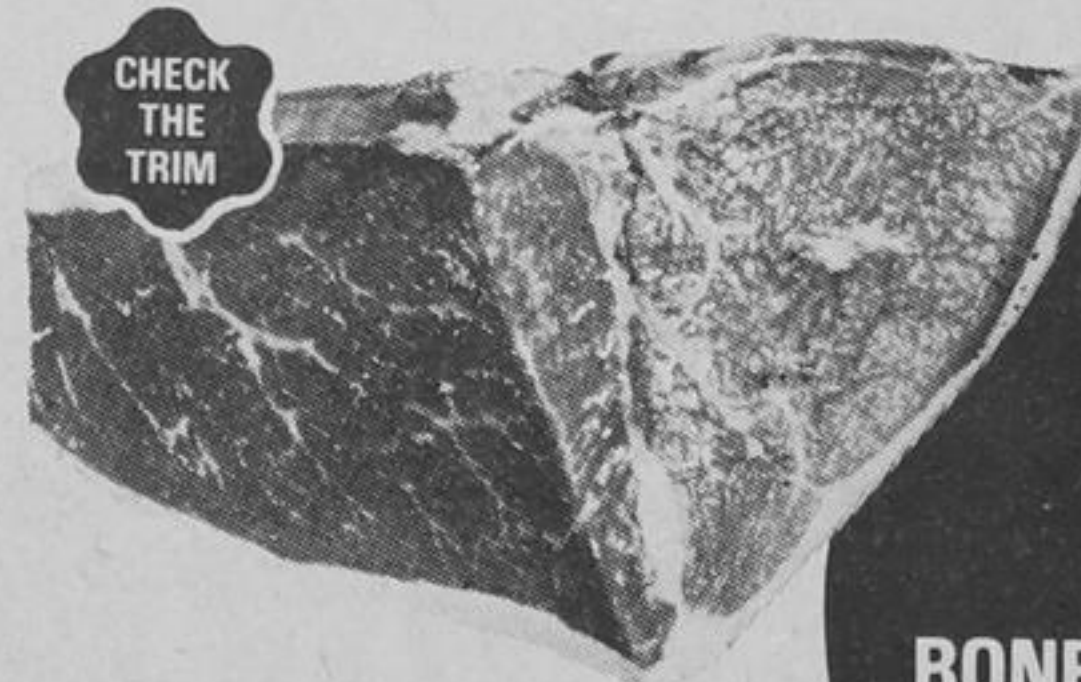
Each meeting begins with a showing of "Reflections on Violence", a 25 minute documentary film which explores the many issues of media violence and its effects.
