

# Track club to hold 'garage sale'

RICHMOND HILL — The Richmond Hill Athletic Club will be holding a "garage sale" next Saturday and there's a car that goes with the garage. Well, sort of.

The doors will be cast open at 173 Trayborn Drive for a morning of bargains and goodies with the whole idea being to raise funds for the club's activities.

Highlight of the affair will be a 1973 Toyota Corolla car (obtained through the good graces of Gerry Paxton and Bob Hickman of Wilson-Niblett Motors) which will be on display for resale.

The red car was purchased from the local dealer at wholesale pricing and

will be sold by the members of the club. Any profit realized will be channelled for development of track and field in Richmond Hill. The project is being handled by the bantam-midget team members.

With the summer track season immediately before the athletes, this bargain affair will serve as the only self-help money-making effort by the members for 1976.

Hopes are high for a good many local athletes are expected to show very well this year especially the midget girls (14-15 years) who will have Jane Toporowski, Laurie Stockall, and Rosemary Polcezer all returning for another year of

competition.

Added to these fine performers will be a number of last season bantams, Judy Paxton, Sandra Diggiachinnio and Donna Brownley, to form the basis for the best competitive team ever developed in Richmond Hill for Ontario competitions.

Coaching help

Without exception, the older juvenile-junior team members have stepped forward for 1976 to offer coaching and administrative assistance to insure that Richmond Hill's younger representatives carry the green and white colors with distinction.

The expected increase in travel costs, (Richmond Hill does not have adequate training or competitive facilities) to reach the summer track meets has been estimated and so the garage sale was organized.

Working hard, for their own benefit, will be the entire bantam and midget

# North York Rangers win Clancy

WILLOWDALE — The North York Rangers won the 1976 Richmond Hill International Midget hockey tournament by beating the favored Hamilton Huskies 7-2 in the grand championship game.

It was no fluke. The same Rangers proved it last week when they won the King Clancy

Midget A championship at St. Michael's Arena.

Guess who they beat? The Hamilton Huskies in the final two games by identical 3-2 scores after losing the opener by 3-0.

North York's assistant coach Stan Hotchkiss was jubilant along with coach Ralph Beer.

"Hamilton was of the opinion that our

tournament win in Richmond Hill was a fluke and they told us before that first game," said Hotchkiss. "When they beat us 3-0 they were sure of it."

But something happened on the way to St. Michaels for the final two games.

The never-say-die Rangers won both games by 3-2 scores in overtime in dramatic fashion.

It was the end of a fine season for the

Rangers after winning the Richmond Hill tournament which Hotchkiss terms as one of the "finest of its kind."

"I thought the hockey in the finals at Richmond Hill was the best I've seen in some time there and I've been to a number of their tournaments. And I mean the A and B finals as well as the championship game. It's a great tournament."

# Dream Lake for fish

Just picture the shores of Lake Ontario — fishing piers extending out into the lake, lined with anglers catching white Bass, freshwater Drum and jumbo yellow Perch.

In the lake itself, you may find Sunfish, Black Crappie, and Pike hiding among artificial brush piles and log cribs.

Further out, boaters can anchor over a reef made from concrete rubble and old car tires. Well, at least this is what now is proposed.

What it is

Let's take a look at what has already been done in and around the Toronto area. Throughout April, 1976, 100,000 Rainbow Trout were planted upstream from Georgetown where most of the good spawning gravel beds exist. Half of the Rainbows are spring spawners while the other half spawn in the fall.

Young Rainbow

These young Rainbow, averaging seven inches in length, will head downstream to Lake Ontario. They will have acquired an imprint of the Credit River and should return later to spawn. Unlike the Coho, they are capable of reproducing naturally



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and no further stocking should be necessary.

Long journey

With the old hydro dam at Streetsville breached by high spring waters, the returning Rainbows will be able to ascend as far as Georgetown.

It has been more than 100 years since migrating fish from Lake Ontario have been able to reach that far regularly, and, perhaps someday, in the not too distant future, the fish will reach the Forks of the Credit as they did when the French explorers first travelled Ontario.

Stocking Coho

In addition to Rainbow, the Ministry of Natural Resources is continuing its experimental stocking of Coho Salmon, one hundred thousand of which have been planted during the month of April, 1976. These young fish, averaging five inches in length, will return as adult spawners in the following fall.

The outlook of the 1976 fall Coho run in the Credit River is not as rosy as it was last year. There was a very poor return of the very important Salmon jacks last autumn. The weir, used to check the fall run, will again be installed in the Credit in September this year.

Yearling Trout

As part of the Ministry's effort to rehabilitate the fishery of Lake Ontario, 100,000 yearling Lake Trout will be stocked in the lake just offshore from Port Credit this month.

Credit River

The Credit River is one of the few streams on the Canadian side of the lake still suitable for migrating fish. With most of the man-made obstacles removed, the river is opening up to the fish, and it may not be long before you see fly fishermen along its banks casting for trout, while down on Lake Ontario's shores, a youngster battles a fighting Pike.
