

# Students of drafting display their work

THORNHILL — York County Board of Education Technical-Drafting Curriculum committee has arranged an exhibition of work by students in the county's secondary schools.

All work submitted to this exhibit was assigned as regular class projects.

Approximately 90 students entered, and were judged by professionals.

It was hoped this exhibition would create interest in the fields of architectural and engineering drafting as well as recognizing excellence of student effort.

— senior open, first, Martin York, Thornhill Secondary School; second, Steve Milmine, Huron Heights Secondary School; citation, Wayne Pugh, Huron Heights Secondary School.

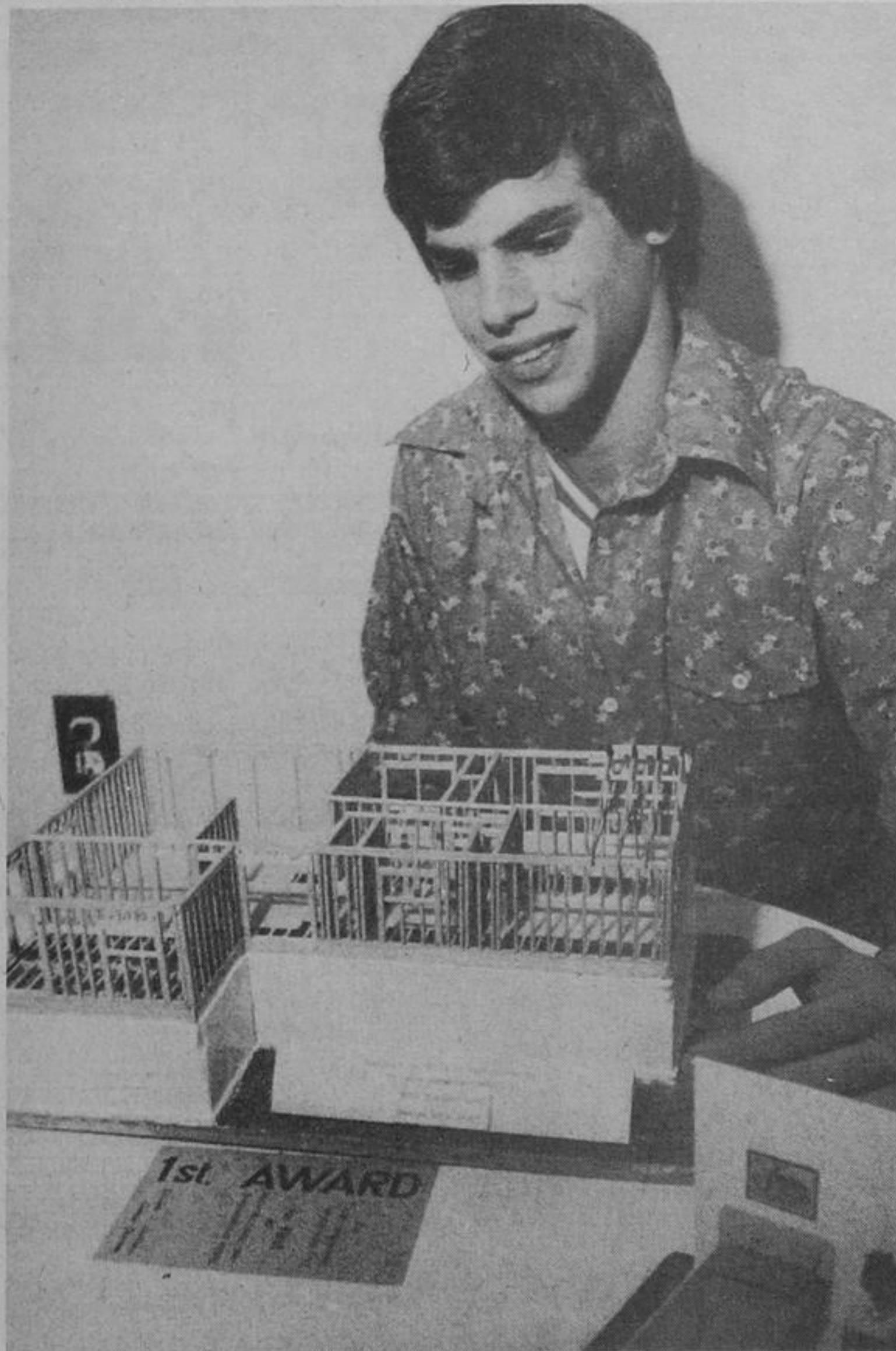
All these senior entries were submitted by students in Years 3 and 4.
