

THORNHILL - When Michael Leider was two years old, friends of his parents persuaded them to take Michael down to an agency for an evaluation on his ability to appear in television commercials.

The owner of an agency advised them to invest in composites, which were sent to several studios. His agent is Ksana Artists.

Michael, now five, has done commercials for Eatons, Tonka Toys, Play Do and Lipton's Cup-A-Soup among

He lives with his family in the Olde Towne area.

Approximately 10 children are selected from their photographs and invited for an interview.

Although their parents bring them, they are not allowed in at the interview. But Mrs. Leider said that in the case of a commercial children, are screened on closed-circuit television to show how they photograph.

They are also required to repeat lines, if necessary.

Long hours Michael's longest shooting period was a two-day commercial for Eatons. It was set in a park.

On the first day he worked from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m.; the next from 8:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. In another commercial he worked a

full day - 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Children are required to be under the lights for only 20 minutes at a time, and take 15-minute breaks in between.
