RICHMOND HILL — It will be mostly comedy, with a little bit of mystery thrown in, when Richmond Hill Curtain Club presents its 1976-77 season of plays.

New school projects planned by trustees

AURORA — Markham could add to its number of schools, as a result of the efforts of Doreen Quirk.

The trustee made a spirited pitch for them during a discussion of capital expenditure projects at York county board of education last week.

Discussion on the list of projects, which rose from seven to 10, was put over from the previous meeting to give trustees another look at their immediate needs.

Three of those needs, as emphasized by Mrs. Quirk, were a new secondary school in Unionville, a new public school in Thornhill and \$675,000 in

renovations for Thornhill secondary school.

Other new schools in the offing will be in Markham, Newmarket and East Gwillimbury.

Renovations and additions will be made at Richmond Hill high school, Reesor Park public school in Markham, Summitview in Whitchurch - Stouffville, and Eva L. Dennis in King.

Planning and building committee chairman, Harry Bowes of Whitchurch - Stouffville, said he expected only about four of the 10 projects, which will be sent to the ministry of education, will get approval.

Hydro says beware of phoney inspectors

WILLOWDALE — If someone claiming to be an electrical inspector pays you a visit, you'd better make sure he's who he says he is.

Ontario Hydro's central region office here advises householders to check the identification of inspectors before admitting them into their homes. Several cases of impersonation of inspectors recently have resulted in burglary and theft.

"Ontario Hydro electrical inspectors do not wear uniforms but they carry

cards identifying them as electrical inspectors, with name, signature, employee number and picture so that identification cannot be mistaken," said Leslie Stoch, Inspection superintendent of Hydro's central region.

Ontario Hydro is responsible for inspection of all new electric wiring and electrical appliance installations throughout Ontario, including municipalities served by local Hydro systems.

"Inspectors seldom appear unannounced," Stoch added. "When they visit a home they do so for the purpose of inspecting a specific piece of electrical wiring or equipment."

"They always announce their purpose and in most cases the householder is expecting them. The exception is when the electrical inspection department is asked to make an inspection by the local fire department, the fire marshal's office or other municipal department because wiring is thought to be unsafe."

Stoch advises householders to check identification of the inspector and learn the purpose of the visit.

TAKE NOTICE that the Corporation of the Town of Richmond Hill has applied to The Ontario Municipal Board for approval of its proposed By-law 100-76 being a by-law passed pursuant to the provisions of Section 359 of The Municipal Act to amend By-law 1289 which imposed a Special Charge on classes of buildings that impose or may impose a heavy load on the municipal sewer or water systems.

The proposed by-law 100-76 is set out below.

Objections to the passing of the said by-law may be filed in writing with the Town Clerk at the Municipal Offices of the Town of Richmond Hill within 21 days of the 21st day of July, 1976.

BY-LAW NO. 100-76

A By-law to Impose a Special Charge on classes of buildings that impose or May Impose a heavy load on the Municipal Sewer or Water Systems

WHEREAS the erection or enlargement of residential, commercial and industrial buildings impose or may impose a heavy load on the municipal sewer or water system or both by reason of which municipal expenditures are or may be required to provide additional sanitary or storm sewers or water supply capacity that would not otherwise be required;

AND WHEREAS authorization has been given to impose a special charge over and above all other rates and charges to pay for all or part of the cost for providing the additional capacity;

AND WHEREAS The Ontario Municipal Board by its Order made on the 6th day of July, 1976, approved the imposition of the special charges hereinafter set forth;

NOW THEREFORE, THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF RICHMOND HILL, HEREBY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. THAT from and after the passage of this by-law, as a condition of the issuance of a building permit for the erection or enlargement of any of the classes of buildings set out in Column I of the following Table, the charges in the amounts set out in Column II of the Table in respect of Storm and Sanitary Sewers and in the amounts set out in Column III of the Table in respect of water supply facilities, shall be payable over and above all other rates and charges, prior to and as a condition of the issuance of such building permit.

COLUMN 1 CLASS OF BUILDING	COLUMN II STORM AND SANITARY SEWERS	COLUMN III WATER SUPPLY FACILITIES
(a) Residential	\$300.00 per suite or dwelling unit	\$300.00 per suite or dwelling unit
(b) Commercial	Nil per acre of lot area	Nil for each 5,000 sq. ft. of lot area
(c) Industrial	Nil per acre of lot area	Nil for each 5,000 sq. ft. of lot area

2. THAT the following are exempt from any charges imposed under this By-law.

- (a) Every building on land exempt from taxation under any general or special Act.
- (b) Every building on land in respect of which an agreement has been entered into with the municipality under Section 33 of The Planning Act or any predecessor thereof.
- (c) Every building or any land in respect of which a contribution to provide sanitary or storm sewers or water supply facilities has been made within the ten years previous to the application for a building permit, to the extent of the contribution so made.
- (d) Every residential building having not more than two dwelling units.
- (e) Every building, other than a residential building, with an inside floor area of not more than 3,000 square feet.

3. By-law 1289 be and is hereby repealed.
