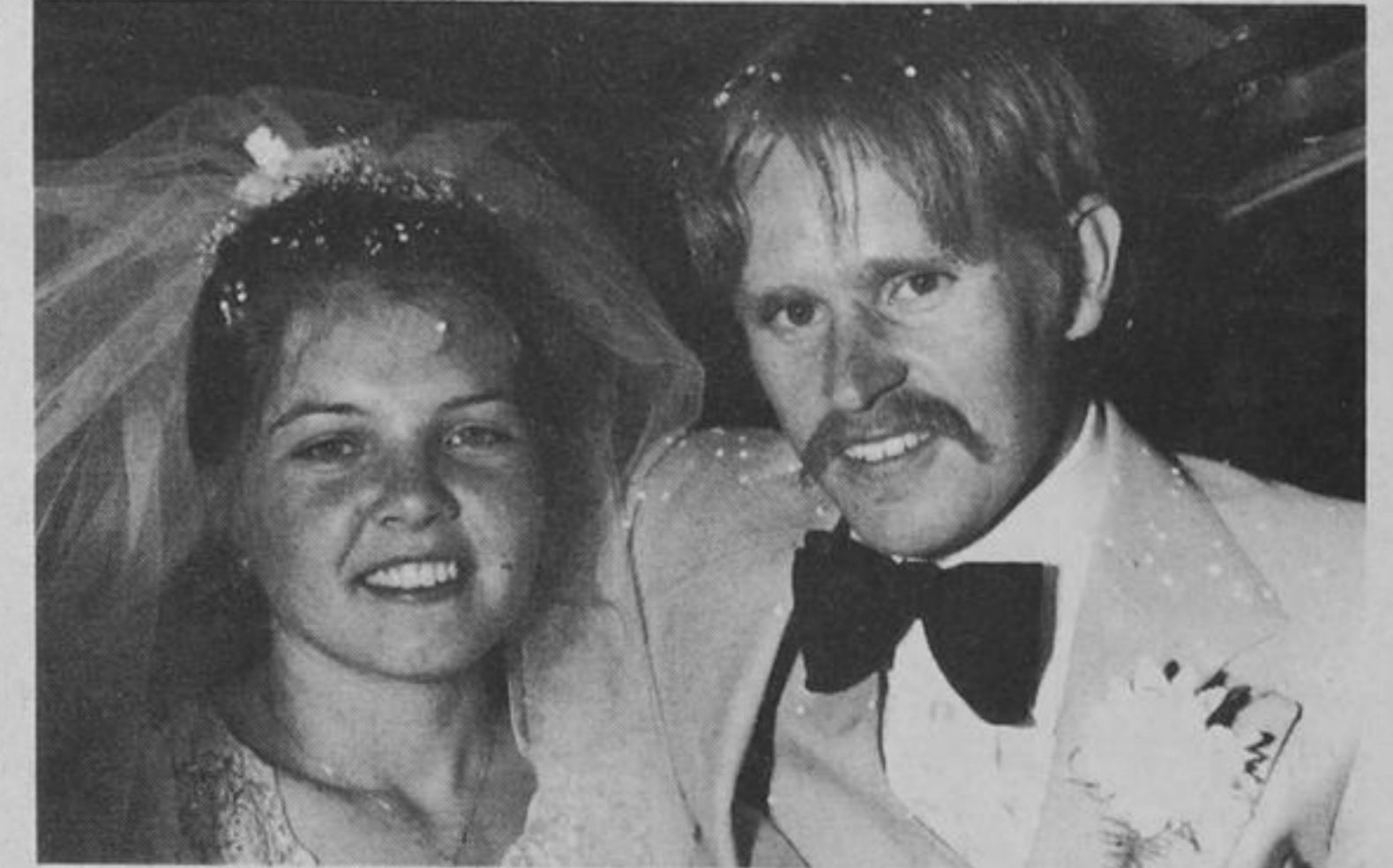

## Couple wed

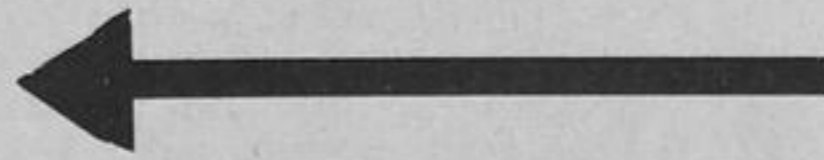

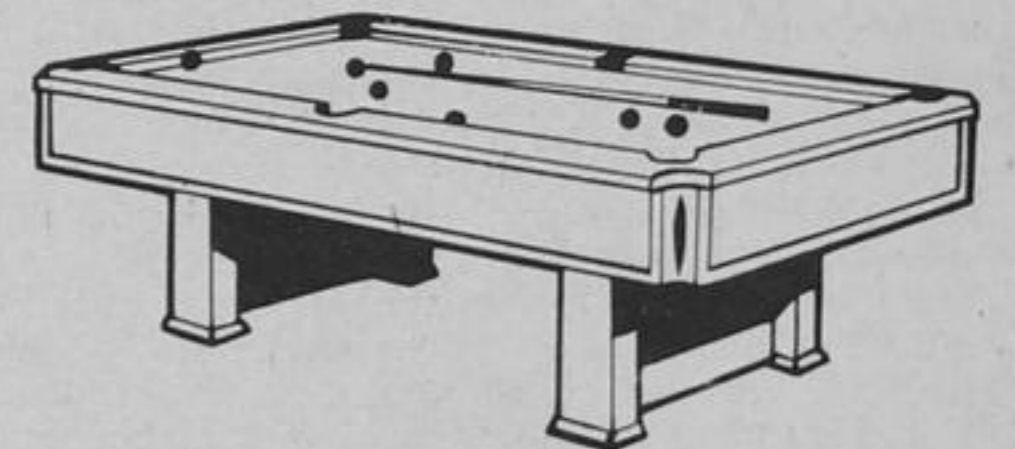
