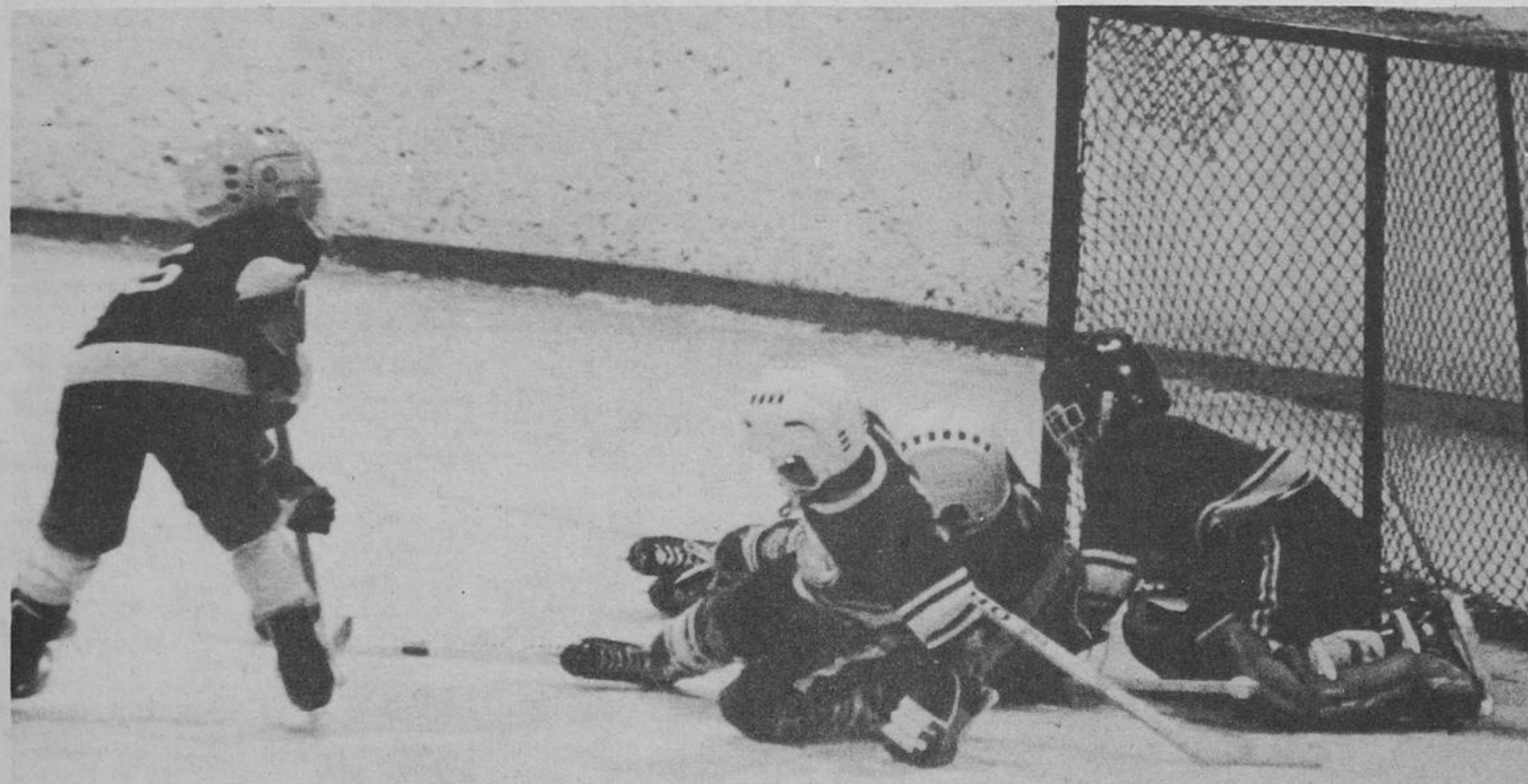


Godfrey scores 6 for 'Ridges

Each zone qualifies 10 men and 9 women that make up three singles representatives a mens team a womens team and one mixed team.

These bowlers will then compete with 23 other zones to decide the Ontario Champions. From there they will go to the World Championships to be held in Ontario this year.
