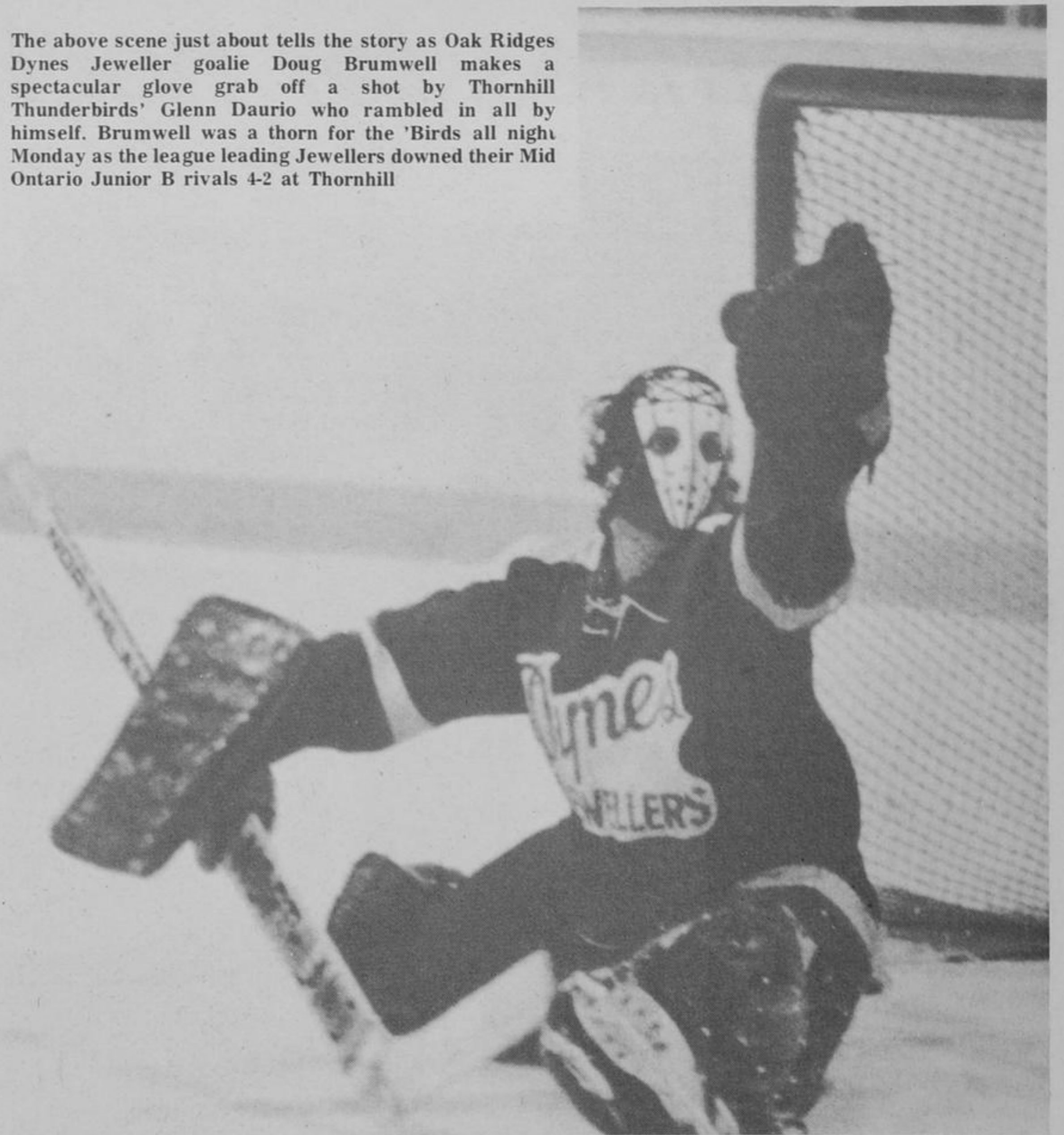




Brumwell to the rescue

Dynes do it to birds 4-2

THORNHILL — The Thornhill Thunderbirds ran into a magician by the name of Doug Brumwell Monday night and that was the whole story of the game.

Oak Ridges goalie Brumwell used his stick like a magic wand as he turned back the Thunderbirds to lead his team to a 4-2 win here in Mid Ontario Junior B hockey action.

"What can you say about Brumwell's play after you say fantastic," said

Dynes Jeweller coach Pete Artemchuk. "He was just unbelievable stopping Thornhill cold on a couple of occasions when we were two men short."

The best
"He's got to be the best goalie in our league or the Provincial 'A' for that matter," concluded Artemchuk.

The win gave the front-running Jewellers something of a stanglehold grip on first place leading Barrie by eight points.

Early lead

Dynes jumped into a 2-0 lead in the first period on goals by Cam Reston from Dale Roffey and Mike Fitzgibbons; and Boyd Young from Neil Crockford and Steve Sherman.

Thornhill came back on a goal by Bruce Clatworthy from Scott Howson and then tied the game on one by Bud Shirley from Wally Stankov and Greg Chappell.

Brumwell stops them

Thornhill threw everything but a cannon at goalie Brumwell who kept right on stopping them cold. The big break for Dynes came at 10:10 while they were still short handed.

Dave Stuart checked a Thunderbird player in his own end and got the puck to Jimmy Clement who fired it home. Dale Roffey got the clincher at 12:25 from Steve Sherman.

Unlucky

Thunderbirds' coach Ralph Beer thought that "we were unlucky on a couple of goals and they were in turn lucky on a couple. But they all come out as line drives in the paper the next morning."

He did add that the goaltending of Brumwell "was a little unreal at times." Thornhill outshot the Jewellers 39-27 on the game. Ed Takamatsu was in the twines for the Birds.

Beer added that it was a "hell of a hockey game and our kids played really well. We just got beat."

Flat

Artemchuk thought his team generally "came up flat" except for

The Jewellers were fresh from a 9-4 clobbering of Owen Sound Tuesday night of last week. They led 3-1 at the end of the first period and 5-1 going into the third.

Leading the scoring parade were Jimmy Clement with two goals; Steve Sherman, two and two; Cam Reston, three and two; and Roffey with one goal and four assists. Dave Stuart got one goal.

14 points

The line of Roffey, Sherman and Reston were particularly outstanding compiling 14 points between them.

In the meanwhile, the Birds were dropping a 7-2 "lack lustre" game to Midland with Gary Langfield and Kerry Pim getting the only goals.

The Jewellers are off till next Monday night when they meet Orillia in a 7:30 game at Bond Lake Arena.

The Thunderbirds also played Barrie Sunday and tied them 4-4 with goals going to Glen Daurio, Bruce Clatworthy, Bob Hunter, and Bud Shirley.

They play in Barrie tomorrow night (Thursday) and are on home the following Monday to Owen Sound.

Rams bouncing back!

RICHMOND HILL — The Richmond Hill Rams put together two wins last week in Provincial Junior A action and coach Carl Brimblecombe was acting as if he wasn't surprised a bit.

"They're coming, they're starting to get their confidence," said Brimblecombe. "They're a very young team and it simply takes time."

The Rams downed the Toronto Nats

4-2 last Friday night after edging by the Ajax Merchants 4-3 here Tuesday night of last week.

Big hero in the Friday night conquest of the Nats had to be brilliant goaltending of Brian Stankiewicz particularly in the second period when the Rams sat back after compiling a 2-0 lead in the first session.

Great goaltending

"There's no question about the fact that we're getting fantastic goaltending from Stankiewicz," said Brimblecombe. "He's holding us in there. He's by far the best in the league in my opinion."

Another suddenly blooming goal scorer was Kenny Paraskevin, the ex-Michigan hockey player, who fired home three goals against the Nats and one against the Merchants.

"That whole line of Paraskevin, Danny Jones and John Olds are keeping us in there," said Brimblecombe. "Especially Olds, he's really going good."

Paraskevin hot

Friday night's game saw Paraskevin fire home the first two goals to give the Rams a 2-0 bulge in the first period with assists to Frank Nigro, Bill Stephenson, Jones and Olds.

The Nats bounced back in the second on goals by Phil Gaidy and Marc Duquette but the same Mr. Paraskevin off-set that with his third counter of the evening from, of course, Mr. Olds and Jones.

Jones got the only goal of the final 20 minutes from Nigro and Mike Walker.

Hit posts

There were numerous posts and cross bars hit at each end of the rink in the wide open game which saw Stankiewicz chosen as top star of the game.

The Rams-Ajax game saw the Hill team dominate the game territorially and particularly in the second period when they grabbed a 4-1 lead.

They were frustrated throughout by the brilliant goaltending of Mike Nash in the Ajax goal.

Ajax made it close in the closing minutes by scoring twice on their infrequent sorties into the Rams zone.

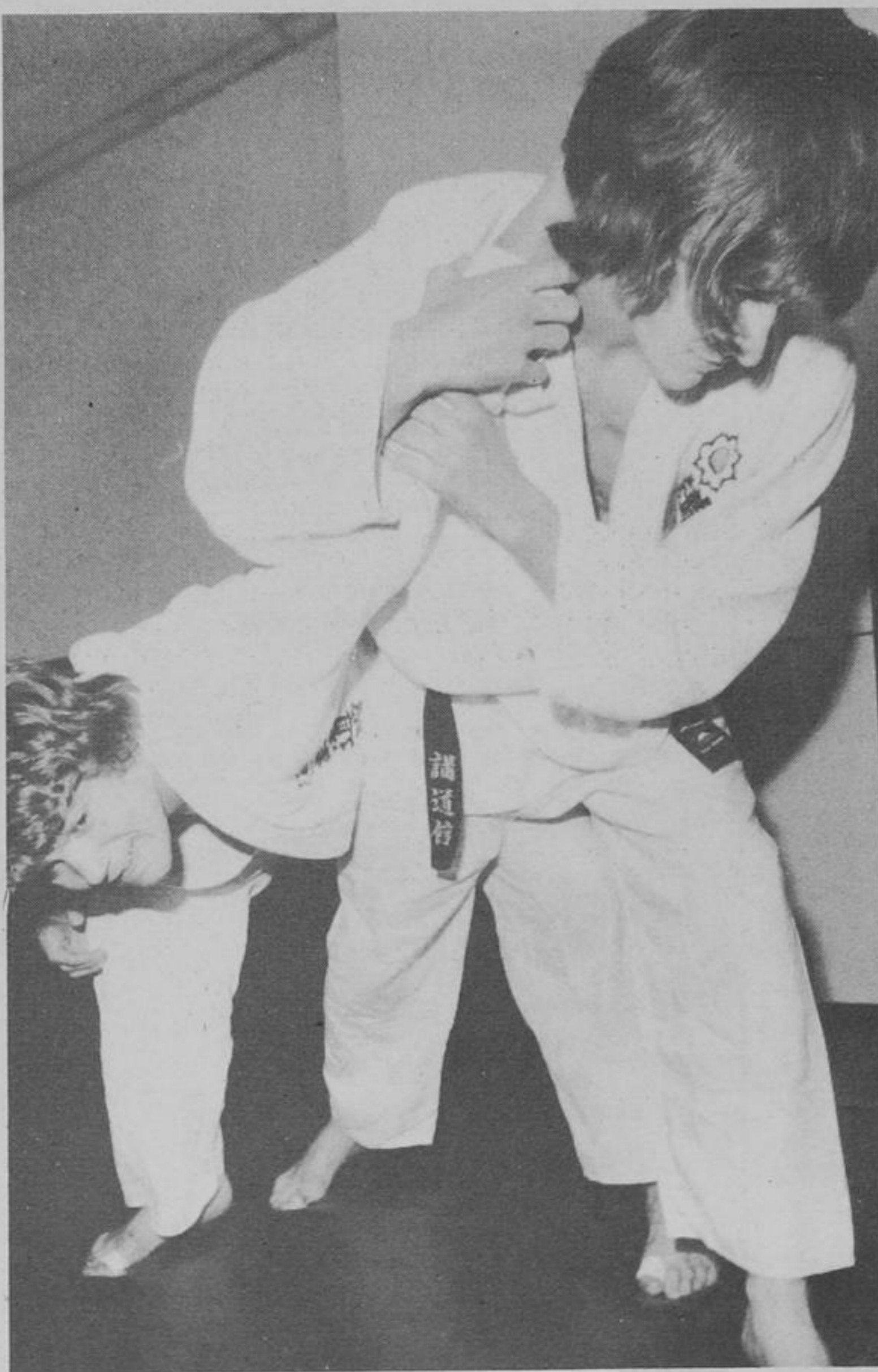
The bash begins at 8 p.m. Christmas dance all ready? Why it's only, only, good heavens, it is December.
